NEW APPLE PACT IS HAILED AS GAINFUL
 OREGON, WASHINGTON, IDAHO AND MONTANA GROWERS BELIEVE IT WILL SPUR INDUSTRY

Powerful Agencies Unite
 (From Oregonian, Jan. 25.)
 Seattle, Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Apple-growers of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana and sales agencies representing a great output agreeing to operate under a central governing board, the pact is said to augur well for the future of the apple industry of the Northwest. The selling agencies now joined with the growers in the program outlined by the by-product committee represent a total tonnage of 15,000 cars.
 The agreement created great enthusiasm among the 200 delegates when it was read by ex-Senator W. H. Paulhamus, chairman of the by-products committee, who explained it in detail. All the distributing agencies signed it unconditionally with the exception of the Northwest Fruit Exchange, which reserved the right to refer the question to the growers' local units whose fruit it handles.
 The agreement is: "That in case the growers of the four Northwestern states, representing in districts and through the affiliated agencies 75 per cent of the total tonnage, form a central governing board for the purpose of regulating the marketing of their products in order to get the best distribution and to prevent the demoralization of prices.
 "That we will, should we be so requested, join with the said governing board in studying the crop and marketing conditions with a view to helping the growers to estimate the marketing value of their products and will furnish to said governing board at the close of each day's business, and sooner in special cases, copies of all quotations, sales reports, sales records, sales returns, inspector's reports, and all letters, telegrams and conversations that have a direct bearing on the selling of the fruit.
 "We further agree that, if requested by the growers so to do, we will remit to such governing board not to exceed one-half cent per box on all apples and pears and one-quarter cent per box on all of the small fruit that we may market, when returns are received and made, this amount being deducted as a charge in making settlement for the fruit."
 This agreement was signed by Yakima County Horticultural Association, by W. M. Nelson; Richey & Gilbert Company, by H. M. Gilbert, president; Wenatchee Produce Company, by Conrad Rose; Wenatchee Fruit-growers' Association, by W. T. Clark; J. Macphree Ferguson and J. E. Shannon; Spokane Valley Growers' Union, by Edward Pierce; North Pacific Fruit Distributors, by H. F. Davidson, president, and J. H. Robbins, general manager; Northwestern Fruit Exchange, by Reginald H. Parsons, president, and W. F. Gwinn, general manager; Wright Fruit Company, by J. Howard Wright; Pomonca Ranch, by J. L. Dumas; Arcadia Valley Fruit-growers' Association, by A. A. Craig, manager.

SPRAY MEETING CONTINUED
 "Spraying" was found to be such a comprehensive subject that the growers last Saturday adjourned until Saturday, January 30 (tomorrow), to complete the discussion.
 At tomorrow's meeting specialized subjects will be considered. Mr. Joy will lead in the discussion of the Codling Moth control, giving special attention to the use of hatching cages as a means of positively ascertaining the date to spray for the several broods. Mr. Kollandsrud will start the discussion on Scab Control, and as he has given this fungus considerable study, the growers may expect to get some tangible data upon which to base their spray operations.

MOOSE NATIONAL DIRECTOR HERE
 E. S. LaCroix, deputy national director of the Loyal Order of Moose, with present headquarters at Hood River, was in town this week rounding up recruits to swell the herd of Moose which he has already gathered in Hood River and which was organized into a lodge last Saturday night. The Loyal Order of Moose has the third largest membership of any benevolent or fraternal order in existence and is rapidly increasing in numbers and popularity, so that the expression "he is a Moose" is equivalent to saying "he is a good citizen." Mr. LaCroix stated while in town last Monday, that he expected to have a membership of 100 in Hood River in the next two weeks, and he wanted a good sized class from Mosier to swell the list. The charter will be open for the next two weeks and during this time the fee will be only \$5 to join. HAVE YOU GOOD FARM LAND TO RENT?

Portland, Ore., January 26, 1915:—The farm land bureau of the Oregon State Immigration Commission is receiving a good many inquiries in regard to the possibility of renting good farm land, and nearly all these inquiries come from practical, experienced farmers who are not at this time financially able to purchase land. The Bureau is now planning to add this rental feature to its other work and would like, as soon as possible, to make up a generous list of such offerings. No fees or commissions of any kind will be charged, and in all cases the reliability and fitness of the applicant will be carefully investigated.
 Farmers and land owners throughout the state who have land for which they have no present use, and who would like to derive all income from such acreage, are invited to write to J. W. Brewer, manager of the farm land bureau, at Portland, for blanks on which to list such holdings.

OREGON HAS 44,371 FARM HOMES

There are now 151,858 homes in Oregon, according to a report issued recently by the Census Bureau, while ten years ago the number was 91,214, compared with 63,791 homes in 1890. Twenty-nine per cent of the Oregon homes are farm homes, compared with 40 per cent in 1900 and 43 per cent in 1890. The number of homes in this state free of incumbrance at the present time is 60,500, while 25,270 are encumbered and 58,279 are rented.
 In the entire nation there are 20,255,555 homes. Of this number 6,123,610 are farm and 14,131,645 are urban homes.

WOOL MEN TO BENEFIT

Of interest to all wool growers in this and adjoining states is a movement recently inaugurated to establish a big wool warehouse in Portland to handle the clip from all flocks in this territory, thus eliminating the speculator and broker who have heretofore cut deeply into the annual receipts of the sheep men. Under the new plan all wool will be graded in Portland and the producer will be advised exactly what his wool is worth. It is estimated that this plan will net the woolmen from 3 to 5 cents per pound over former prices.

PATRONIZE THE MOVIES

The moving picture show at Chown's Hall last Tuesday night was very good indeed and well worth the price of admission—10 and 15c. But the house was very small; so small, in fact, that the proprietor, Mr. Kelly, stated that unless the attendance increased it would not pay him to continue the show, as the expense would not justify it. If the Mosier public want this kind of entertainment, which is good and cheap, they should be more liberal in their patronage. Mr. Kelly will put another show on tomorrow night.
