WIRELESS CARRIES VOICE 2500 MILES

Radio Phone Proven Success by U. S. Navy Department.

FIRST EXPERIMENT SPANS CONTINENT

Conversation Is Carried On Between Washington, D. C., and Naval Station at Mare Island.

Washington, D. C. — Wireless telephone communication across the continent was accomplished for the first time Thursday, when experiments extending over several months culminated in successful transmissions of the human voice by radio from the great naval plant at Arlington, Va., to the station at Mare Island, Cal., 2500 miles away.

The experiments were conducted under direction of Captain Bullard, chief of the navy's radio service, in co-operation with the American Telephone & Telegraph company and the Western Electric company.

Secretary Daniels, in announcing the report, predicted that further development of wireless telephony would make great changes in long distance communication both for military and navy service and commercial usage.

Successful operation of a device for automatically transferring to the radio telephone conversations originating on metallic circuits also was accomplished in the tests. President Vail and other officials of the American Telephone & Telegraph company at New York talked easily with the Mare Island station over an ordinary metallic line to Arlington and thence by radio across the continent.

"The fact that the voices can be started on a land wire and automatically transmitted to a voice radio-transmitter," said Secretary Daniels, "holds out hope that persons inland readily could be put in touch by telephone with others at sea through some central transmitting station."

The navy department's formal announcement in part follows:

"Secretary Daniels is pleased to announce the successful outcome of experiments which have been carried on for the last few months by the American Telephone & Telegraph company and Western Electric company in co-operation with the radio stations under the jurisdiction of the Navy department, by which long-distance wireless telephony has been made possible."

Lottery Game Dies Natural Death in San Francisco

San Francisco—Persons in all walks of life had their last chance Thursday to participate in the \$20,000 capital prize in San Francisco lottery. There was no formal order sent out by the police. It was tacitly understood by the seven lottery companies, as the result of an "order in council" issued by the Police commission, that "the game" was off—at least for a time.

The police judge fined a negro woman a patrolman arrested with lottery tickets in his possession. The prisoner said he would have to beg or steal now that his occupation of selling lottery tickets was taken from him. It was admitted that the ousting of the lotteries will cut off in fines accruing to the city treasury thousands of dollars a month.

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Wires Finds Bullet.

Omaha—The location of a bullet in the brain of a man by wireless electric waves at an Omaha hospital Thursday is said to be a new development of the use of electricity in surgery. The instrument used was made by Dr. F. H. Millener, whose wireless discoveries have heretofore attracted attention. E. H. Mrsney, of Clarkson, Neb., was accidentally shot in the head two weeks ago. He was too weak to withstand probing in the usual manner. The electrical experiment proved successful and the bullet was removed.

Liner Gets 'Farewell.'

Honolulu, T. H. — The Pacific liner Manchuria sailed Thursday for San Francisco, festooned with wreaths bearing the legend: "Aloha Pacific Mail." All Honolulu assembled to see the departure of the last Pacific Mail vessel. On her arrival at San Francisco the Manchuria will be turned over to the International Mercantile Marine, which has already taken possession of the other five steamships which, with the Persia—sold to the Toyo Kisen Kaisha—constituted the Pacific Mail company's Pacific fleet.

Sailor Rules Schooner.

San Francisco—S. P. Ware, one of the crew of the American schooner Sehome, which arrived here Thursday from Sydney, Australia, was turned over to the police by John Kiltz, the ship's captain, who alleged Ware laid out the captain and crew with a belaying pin off Apia, American Samoa, and took command of the vessel for 24 hours. Captain Kiltz said he escaped, obtained a revolver and regained his command.

Third Alfalfa Crop Put In.

Portland—Following is a summary of the crop conditions in Oregon for the week, as reported to the local office of the weather bureau by special correspondents throughout the state:

Although showers fell in the Western counties on the 23d, 24th and in some limited areas of North Central Oregon on the 24th, which benefited pastures and gardens to some extent, there is still need for rain in all portions of the state.

The warm weather has been favorable for the maturing of fruit and garden truck. The picking and drying of prunes has been about completed and the harvesting of apples and pears has begun. In the Eastern Oregon valleys the peach crop was very heavy and the quality excellent, but owing to an over-supplied market many tons of the choicest fruit is going to waste.

Threshing has been practically completed and the farmers are preparing the soil for seeding, but little wheat will be sown until the fall rains have commenced.

While waiting for the rain, ranchers are hauling their wood and winter supplies.

Irrigated crops of alfalfa are very good, and the third crop is being put up in some sections.

Tomatoes are plentiful and of excellent quality. Seasonable fruits and vegetables are in the local markets in abundance, and the quality is very good.

Cranberries Are Popular.

Tacoma — Cranberries are proving unusually popular with the trade and the supply on the local produce market is good. As a substitute for blackberries, dealers say, cranberries are what is wanted. The berries are rolling in from Cape Cod and are of fine size and color and hold up unusually well in shipment. They are quoted wholesale at \$9.50 @ 10 per barrel. This week saw the first appearance of this season of grapefruit from the Isle of Pines. The first receipts are a trifle green and are bringing 15 cents each.

Egg Prices Go Up.

Tacoma — Some dealers sent prices on fresh ranch eggs soaring and wholesale quotations now are from 35 to 38 cents a dozen. Cold storage eggs remain steady at 27 @ 28 cents a dozen. The rise in the fresh product is attributed to a scarcity and an advance of the ruling market of Puget Sound. Butter and cheese are unchanged. Favorable weather conditions have prolonged the tomato season and the best ones to be had are offered at 45 @ 50c a box. Cantaloupes, grapes and apples are among the leading sellers.
