PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL

The common council met in regular session on Wednesday night with the following members present: Mayor Race, and Councilmen Camp, Chown, Hudson, Merrill, Robinson and Wood.
A communication was received from the Norris Safe & Lock company, of Portland, regarding Warrant No. 13 issued to them for \$125 over a year ago, and which they maintained they had never received. Several communications have followed during this time between the City and the above mentioned company relative to this matter. This warrant was called for among others some time ago through the columns of the Bulletin, and it is now presumed that it has been lost. Councilman Robinson moved that a duplicate warrant be drawn, and the motion carried.

Councilman Wood, chairman of the fire and water committee, reported that parties have taken the fire ladders out of the engine house and failed to bring them back. He urged the necessity of keeping them there. Mayor Race agreed that all fire apparatus should never be taken out except for repairs and in case of fire. Fire Chief Burpee has twice charged the chemical for the fire engine since his appointment this summer, and has kept sacks in the building in case of fire. He stated that the couplings are in good working order, and in fact everything in readiness in case of danger.
