Washington, D. C.—Germany has intructed Count von Bernsstorff to inform the United States government that the assurances regarding the furne continuance of submarine warfare, given in the Lusitania and Arabia cases, still are binding, but that they apply only to merchantmen of peaceful character.

The Government is understood to contend that armed merchantmen, without regard to the nature of their armament, have shown themselves not to be peaceful, and therefore subject to destruction without warning.

The instructions direct the German ambassador particularly to tell Secretary Lansing that British merchantment armed ostensibly only for defense, have not assumed the character
