STATE SHOULD BUILD HIGHWAY, SAYS KELLY

In a talk to Mosier citizens Saturday, J. L. Kelly, candidate for reelection as representative to the legislature from Wasco and Hood River counties, advocated the building of the Columbia River highway from Hood River to The Dalles, then south to the California line by the state. He reviewed the incidents of the proposed bond issue in Wasco county which has now been dropped, stating that the county should improve the local roads and leave the main highway proposition to the state. At present the road through Multnomah and Hood River counties are only county roads which the state should take over and maintain, asserted Mr. Kelly.

Mr. Kelly stated further that, if elected, he will propose a bill to the effect that the state build and maintain highways through the state, levying a tax of one mill for this purpose. This would bring in over a million dollars each year for road construction and maintenance. In this way these roads would not become burdensome to the counties. Good roads enthusiasts have assured Mr. Kelly, he stated, that Portland is willing to assist in getting local and state roads, and believes that the Columbia River highway should be built and maintained by the state.

"It is possible, concluded Mr. Kelly, that the state will build the road between Hood River and Mosier this summer with the aid of convict labor, allowing them fifty cents a day for their services. Legislators throughout the state have expressed themselves in favor of the state building and maintaining interstate roads, so I believe there will be no trouble in getting a bill to that effect passed by the legislature at the next term."

KELLY FAVORS STATE ROAD MAINTENANCE

The proposal to establish convict camps to work on the Columbia River highway between Hood River and Mosier meets with the hearty approval of J. L. Kelly, of The Dalles, representative in the legislature from Hood River and Wasco counties, who is now seeking the Republican nomination looking to reelection. Mr. Kelly, who was here last week, says:

"I see no reason why we should not establish such convict camps. I would be in favor of paying the men a small daily salary—50 cents, say. If the men are single the money could be saved for them until the termination of their terms of imprisonment. Where the prisoners are married men, their wages might very well be given their families for support."

"The objection might be raised that such a movement would meet with an opposition from organized labor. However, I think that labor unions should concede the right of working the convicts on roads. We now have in the penitentiary several hundred men, the most of whom should be given some kind of employment."

Mr. Kelly, who is president of the Wasco County Good Roads Association, declares that his chief reason for aspiring to reelection to the legislature is actuated by a desire to introduce a bill that will, if passed, make the following roads state controlled and maintained highways: The route from Astoria to Portland; that from Portland south to the California line, known as the Pacific highway, and the Columbia river highway from Portland up the Columbia river to the Washington line in the eastern part of the state.

"Such a move," says Mr. Kelly, "I think can be carried to success. We have the support of the State Highway Commission, the Multnomah county delegation and Governor Witherby. I would propose in my bill that the State Highway Commission be provided with funds for the construction and maintenance of the state roads by annual levy, to begin the first year with a half mill and then to increase the second year, say, to a maximum of a mill. The system of building roads by county bonding results in a lot of unfinished highways. The counties, as experience has shown, soon reach their limits with poor results."
