EXCHANGE BOOSTS CENTRAL PACKING

A bulletin of the Northwest Fruit Exchange says: "In the judgment of this Exchange, one of the biggest improvements that can be made in the handling of this northwestern fruit business lies in the reformation of picking, packing and shipping the fruit. We are thoroughly convinced that the old system of each grower attempting to pack his own fruit is inefficient and wasteful. In the first place, one of the great sins of the business is delay in getting the fruit to the markets. First, there is the delay in picking the apples from the trees at the exact time that they should be picked. Then, there is a great deal of delay and lost motion in getting the apples packed after they are picked; then there is a further delay in getting them assembled and shipped after they are packed. We be-

lieve that in these delays lie a huge loss to the industry, running up into hundreds of thousands of dollars. All concerned in this industry are face to face now with the vital issues of success or failure.

"There has been a great deal of very careless thinking on the subject, and desperate men have been disposed to blame marketing agencies, railroads, dealers, and everybody but themselves. As a matter of fact, there is large room for improvement in every branch of the industry, and the proper way to effect these improvements is to begin at home and get the whole business of production, picking, packing and shipping down to a thoroughly efficient and economic basis, at the same time requiring marketing agents, railroads and dealers to improve their methods also."
