MOOMAW OPTIMISTIC OVER FOREIGN DEAL

(From the Hood River Glacier) Fresh from London and the thrills of Zeppelin raids, S. B. Moomaw, general European agent of the Apple Growers Association and other prominent apples sales agencies throughout the northwest, arrived here last week for his annual conference with local shippers. Mr. Moomaw is the largest distributor of American boxed apples in Europe, and despite the chaotic conditions attendant on the European war has by his close study of the workings of the foreign market succeeded in the past year in placing at handsome prices 200,000 boxes of the Northwest's fruit abroad. Seventy five per cent of the apples handled by the foreign agent were shipped by the local Association. The total tonnage sent abroad last year from the Northwest reached 425,355 boxes. "More than 50 per cent of this," says Mr. Moomaw, "was consumed in the British Isles."

Mr. Moomaw is optimistic over the prospect of next year and states that so far as he can judge by present indications the consumption of fruit abroad will be limited not by any embargo that may be laid by the British government, but more because of the limitations of shipping facilities.

"And I expect more space will be available next fall than during the shipping season of last year," he says. "British shipbuilding yards are busily engaged turning out new bottoms to take the place of those destroyed by mines or submarines. With large numbers of troops already taken to the continent, many of the transports will be turned over to mercantile service, and I know that many ships that have been doing hospital service will be put into the Atlantic trade, the wounded having been transferred to hospitals in England."

The British government, according to Mr. Moomaw did establish a fruit embargo, but it affected only dried, preserved or canned goods and not fresh apples. We had some of our shipping agents in the Northwest who delayed last spring by the British government, but this was caused merely that authorities might make proper search of the shipment in order to ascertain that something other than fruit was not being shipped in the cargo of apples. By the aid of Ambassador Page and Consul General Skinner, the apples were released amicably.

"I have learned, however, since my return to the Northwest, that the centers that certain agents of three or four English importing firms are giving out the impression that fruit importers will be subject to a license the coming shipping season and that their consignment will be permitted to handle the product. I anticipate the licenses, but my dealers will immediately take advantage of the regulations and we will continue to handle Northwest apples just as former years."

"The government took up the question of a fresh fruit embargo last year. When it was mentioned that American apples might be affected, protest from thousands of fruit merchants at once poured in to the central Board of Trade, and in the face of such public sentiment the government was heard to say no more of an embargo on apples. American exporters, however, are determined to win. British traders, they are the stock in trade of hundreds of small grocers and fruit dealers, and must say that the Northwest boxed apple is the chief favorite. So accustomed are the English people to become to Yellow Newtown, so grown at Hood River, that during the past year I sold my supply of this variety at a premium of two shillings above the ruling quotation of other varieties."

Mr. Moomaw says that he experienced two very thrilling moments last fall when German Zeppelins were raiding London. "Last September a bomb was dropped from one of the big air craft within about 40 yards from where I was standing, and some 150 people were killed," he says. "A few weeks later in October, one of the bombs dropped from a Zeppelin exploded within a stone's throw from my office."

"Never in my life have I ever encountered such nerve as the British people are displaying at the present time. They have determined to pursue the war to the very end and they are determined to win. British patriotism was given a new turn by the Zeppelin attacks. These have aided in recruiting, and but for those air raids I do not believe the English people would ever have tolerated a conscription act."

Despite the war, most of the corporate businesses of the British Isles are booming, showing a stimulus over times of peace. The British laborer was never making more money, and he expects to see his business to continue good. If we had been able to ship the product, I really believe that we could have handled at the same prices twice the tonnage of Northwest boxed apples shipped during the past season."

After a visit at the important fruit centers of the Northwest Mr. Moomaw will go for a stay at his home in Virginia, where he is from a pioneer fruit family. He will return to London in August.

CODLING MOTH SPRAY RECOMMENDATIONS

(By Leroy Childs, Hood River Experiment Station) The continued cool weather of the past month has greatly retarded the development of codling moth, a factor which has materially delayed the application of the 30-day, or second codling moth spray. In view of the fact that there occurred during the past year an over-abundance of codling moths, the use of arsenate of lead should not be omitted in any orchard in the valley, that we may not have a duplication of infestation that occurred last year. Many moths over-wintered in the orchards and it will only be a case of thorough, well timed spraying for this pest that we have clean fruit at harvest.

The many factors that present themselves at this time makes the recommendation of a general scale spray very problematical. The investigations carried on by the experiment station have not been extended over a sufficient period of years, covering seasonal variations, to warrant the use of a fungicide with absolute safety, yet we know that with rainy, damp weather occurring the present leaf infestation will give rise to fruit infestation unless a fungicide of some sort is used in the next spray. It is the recommendation of the experiment station that each grower carefully analyze his individual case and choose from one of the following suggestions as to the method of procedure he should follow.

The present development of the codling moth indicates that the lead should all be on the trees by the 20th of June. This is very late to use lime-sulphur with safety, unless cool weather prevails or a burning of fruit may result.

The following suggestions are offered to suit the different orchard conditions:

- A-Orchard practically free from fruit and foliage infection by the 10th of June: 1: Use atomic sulphur 10 pounds to 100 gallons, if the material has been used in one of the earlier sprays. Add arsenate of lead. 2: Weather cool (over 60 in the shade) use lime-sulphur one to 45. Do not drench the trees. Add arsenate of lead. 3: Weather apparently settled and not on or after the 10th of June. Use only arsenate of lead. B-Orchard showing considerable fruit and foliage infestation by the 10th of June: 1: Use atomic sulphur 12 to 100, if this material was used in one of the earlier sprays. Add arsenate of lead. 2: Or use lime-sulphur one to 40. Add arsenate of lead.

On account of the high price of blue stone the use of this material is almost out of the question. It can only be used with safety after the "fuzz" has left the apple. A condition which is not the case this year on account of the lateness of the season.

In orchards showing considerable fungus at the present time it will hardly be safe to omit the fungicide even though some burning results. In three years of experimental work carried on in Hood River the greatest loss that has occurred in our lime-sulphur experiments has not exceeded 10 per cent. However, this season is ten to fifteen days later than we have had to deal with in the past. A factor which might slightly increase the injury. Avoid drenching the trees with spray at this time and do not apply anything, even the arsenate of lead alone, if the weather is extremely hot; that is, during the middle of the day.

The uncertainties that we have to deal with in this last spray clearly indicates the value of accumulative data gathered over a period of years, to meet the varying conditions and the necessity of stability in carrying on such work.
