October 4 to 14.

This will be the first show of the participate. The exhibition has the endorsement of commercial bodies and the railroads and the purpose of the display will be to bring about a better understanding of the many opport in-ties offered to homeseckers in the

Northwest. In addition to displays from Oregon and Washington, Idaho and Montana will send exhibits of fruits, grains and grasses. Alaska, too, will have a sec-tion set aside for agricultural displays and British Columbia will have a part the undertaking. Oregon, Idaho and Montana will

combine on a special day at the expo-sition. From Montana is coming an exhibit under the authority of the state and a special excursion party composed of more than 100 business men. It is hoped to have the governors of Montana, Idaho and Oregon as well as the governor of Alaska and the Premier of British Columbia present at the exposition the same day. Since Portland will not repeat its annual land show this year, the Seattle exposition will afford exhibitors at the Salem fair an opportunity to place their displays before thousands of vis-itors in the Washington metropolis and bring the truthful story of Ore gon's countless opportunities to the attention of many men and women inerested in a home on the land.



TREASURY WOULD BE BENEFITED

Surtax on Earnings of More Than Two Millions To Be Increased From 10 to 13 Per Cent.

Washington, D. C. - Reduction of the income tax exemption from \$3000 to \$2000 for single persons and from \$4000 to \$3060 for those with families was ordered recommended to the sen ate Saturday by Democratic members of the finance committee who are re-

vising the house revenue bill. The change is proposed in an amendment which would put the additional \$1000 taxes in a separate classification and impose on it a normal tax of 1 per cent instead of the 2 per cent assessed against incomes of more than \$3000 for single persons and of more than \$4000 for married persons.

The amendment after an all-day discussion prevailed by a majority of only one vote, opposition persisting to the last.

After announcement of the result by Chairman Simmons, some of the Dem-ocratic senators said that the decision was tentative and might be overturned when the amendment was submitted to

the full membership of the committee. The rollcall on the amendment was not disclosed. 
