**Central Washington Sheep Shipments.**

Wenatchee—The Great Northern railway estimates that between now and the middle of October, 350 cars of sheep will be shipped, as compared with 200 cars during the whole season last year. Fifty cars have already been shipped. The value of the season's shipment will run close to \$500,000. Arrangements have been made with the Canadian government to drive sheep across the line into British Columbia next summer. The first trainload of lambs will leave Thursday for the Chicago market.

**Rot Hits Douglas Prunes.**  
Roseburg, Or.—Word that the situation in regard to the prune crop in Douglas county is alarming because of the recent rains and the attendant setting in of brown rot caused Walter S. Browne, of the Oregon Agricultural College, and Fred Strang, county fruit inspector, to hasten to the orchard districts. Wherever spraying had been done in compliance with the request of the county fruit inspector, little disease was discovered. Those who failed to spray, however, probably will lose a portion of their fruit.

**CASH PRIZES OFFERED FOR BEST DISPLAYS**

More Than \$700 Will Be Distributed at Seattle Land Show for Best County or Community Exhibit.

The best county or community display at the land show in Seattle from October 4 to 14 will receive a cash prize of \$400 and a handsome trophy banner. The second prize is for \$200 and the third prize \$100.

Already there is interest over Washington, Oregon and Idaho in this contest and a large number of Washington communities will try for the prizes. Oregon counties and communities will also be well represented, the displays coming from the state fair at Salem.

The contest has been thrown open to any commercial club, grange, farmers' association, improvement club or other county or community organization in the Northwest.

The management of the Northwest Land Products exposition has set aside \$225 in gold for the best individual farm exhibit. The first prize calls for \$150 and the second prize \$75.

Indications are that the first land show ever staged in Seattle will be the greatest agricultural exhibit since the exposition of 1909. The Great Northern railway has taken space for an agricultural display and the Milwaukee will make a similar exhibit and in addition will bring the Montana state exhibit to the show.

The land show at Seattle will cover more than 70,000 square feet in the heart of the business district, the city authorities giving permission to tent over Fifth Avenue adjoining the Arena, the city's largest assembly hall.
