**SAD ACCIDENT ON HIGHWAY MONDAY**

Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Ford, who arrived here Monday by automobile over the Columbia highway, report a pathetic accident four miles east of Cascade Locks, where that morning, at a narrow point in the road the fine horse driven by an Astoria Swedish family, on route to Bend, became frightened at a westbound automobile and plunged over a precipice.

"My wife and I arrived just after the accident," says Mr. Ford. "In the excitement I failed to secure the names of the parties. The occupants of the machine, I think, were from Portland. Fortunately, in order to save the strength of the horse, the man, with his wife and daughter, were walking up the long hill, else all would probably have been hurt."

"A team was brought from a neighboring farm, and an effort was made to draw the horse up to the road. It was finally determined, however, that he was fatally injured and the animal was shot. The rig was smashed almost into kindling wood."
