Mayor E. A. Race, who went to The Dalles Wednesday morning, on official business as administrator of the estate of the late S. E. Francisco, on his return Thursday morning stated that sentiment in the city of The Dalles appears to favor strongly the bond issue for good roads. He stated that all persons with whom he talked favored it, and that the advisory board to be created by Judge Gunning in the event that a majority of the people favorably on the bonds, is meeting with commendation and approval from all sources, especially from those heretofore either opposed to the issue or dubious.

### ADVISORY BOARD IF BONDS VOTED

"If the voters of Wasco county adopt the good roads bonds November 7, the county court will appoint an advisory board to confer with the court regarding the sale of bonds, the awarding of the contract and also the carrying out of the contract," said County Judge P. S. Gunning Wednesday.

"In fact," continued the judge, "this advisory board will confer with the court in all matters pertaining to the bond sale and the expenditure of money derived from the sale of the bonds."

"Furthermore, the advisory board will decide, with the court, regarding the location of the road from The Dalles to the Jefferson county line. The route from Mosier to The Dalles, and on to Petersburg, has already been surveyed and established.

"Nothing will be done without the advice of this advisory board, and the voters of all sections of Wasco county may be certain that their interests will be protected, for their own personal representatives will be on the board."

"Every commercial body in the county, and every farmers' organization will be asked to appoint a member of the advisory board. If a town or city has no commercial club, the mayor will be requested to make the appointment. You see that the county court will not even select the members of the proposed county road bond issue, and the appointment will be left to each and every community."

The Dalles Chamber of Commerce hereby endorses the plan of County Judge Gunning in the matter of the appointment of an advisory board representing different sections of Wasco county, said board to confer and to work with the county court in the expenditure of funds to be derived from the proposed county road bond issue, and also to work in conjunction with said county court during the actual construction of said roads, according to the appointment plan adopted by the county court.

Instead of his usual instructions to reinvest the amount, he asked us to please hold the funds until after the election. If the Full Land Tax passes, he says he will seek some other point of investment."

### To the Voters of Wasco County:

After several weeks of due consideration, I have accepted the petitions which have been presented me, and filed same with the County Clerk, and have thus again become a candidate for re-election to the office of County Assessor of Wasco County.

I have filled this very important office for the past 4 years, and have endeavored during that time, to familiarize myself with the laws governing said office and to make the assessments according to said law.

In the year 1913, (the year I became assessor), the assessment laws of our State were so changed as to require that all properties be assessed at their full cash value; this I have endeavored to attain, and in so doing have raised the assessable value of Wasco County approximately Five Million Dollars.

In support of this increase in value which is strictly according to the laws, I wish to quote some figures and facts from the State Tax Commissioner's reports for the several years mentioned; said reports being on file in County Clerk Fox's office in The Dalles, Oregon, and are open to the inspection of any and all who care to look them over. Below I give a table of years, values, and percentages as taken from said reports.

From the above table it will readily be seen that Wasco's portion of the entire State Tax paid has decreased rather than increased as some would seem think. This decrease is due to the increased percentages of value in our County over those of former years, and a careful perusal of the several reports on file will show that the smallest proportion of the State Tax ever paid by Wasco County, was in the year 1915.

You will also see that the largest value of assessment was for the same year, thus entirely vindicating a high value through the entire County for assessment purposes.

I have introduced in our County, the individual assessment system made in triplicate at one operation, thus doing away with the very cumbersome system of Tax Rolls in vogue when I became assessor; my mode of Tax Rolls does away with the necessity of long waits for tax receipts when taxes are paid; it also saves a great amount of unnecessary work that was heretofore done in the sheriff's office during Tax Collecting time.

Study these figures and facts, investigate their correctness, and then I ask you to lend me your aid on November 7th to continue this work.
