





Seed Corn is Important. Washington, D. C .- The need of sources from which suitable seed corn can be obtained in the semi-arid and Rocky Mountain regions is great and is increasing. Being a sparsely-set tied country, subject to extreme sea sonal variations, seed of adapted varieties is much scarcer each year than in sections where the corn crop is nore certain. Nothing else would so cheaply turn

many corn failures into successes as the establishment of good sources of the establishment of good sources of seed corn. While a knowledge of corn breeding would be helpful, any farmer can do much toward supplying himself and his neighborhood with better seed corn by starting with a well-tested variety and selecting the best ears from the best stalks each year. By so doing, natural selection assists in weeding out the unfit. Where corn is grown for grain there is no better locality from which to obtain seed than that in which it is






