LOCAL MEN JOIN THE DALLES' PROTEST

(From the Hood River Glacier)

Local business men and members of the Commercial club are aligned with Wasco county citizens in the protest against a proposed plan as suggested by Secretary of the Interior Lane, to turn the Cascade national forest into a national park. The matter was taken up by the local club last spring, and at that time a protest was forwarded to Congress.

According to the bill, advanced by the Secretary of the Interior, the national park would extend well down into the Upper Hood River Valley, and the hunting of deer and bear would be prohibited for Hood River county sportsmen.

Hood River citizens are favorable to the park system proposed by the Forestry department, which has advocated a chain park system along the Columbia River Highway and taking in the peak of Mount Hood. This park would follow highways and take in mountain lakes around the mountain and would extend along the backbone of the Cascades to Mount Jefferson and Crater Lake.
