**WORLD HAPPENINGS OF CURRENT WEEK**

Brief Resume Most Important Daily News Items.

**COMPILED FOR BUSY READERS**

Events of Noted People, Governments and Pacific Northwest and Other Things Worth Knowing.

Potatoes are selling at \$50 a ton in Tacoma.

The Bull Moose party and Prohibitionists are reported about ready to merge.

Baker, Oregon, is having a crowd famine, with the thermometer crawling zero.

The National Guardsmen on the Mexican border are soon to be returned to their respective homes, according to report.

The German raider in the South Atlantic is thought to be the Moewe, which caused havoc among shipping several months ago.

The Canadian contingent on French soil make a successful raid on the German trenches and sweep 1000 yards of line, taking 300 prisoners.

A protest against the "annoyance of suffrage pickets" posted at the gateways of the White House was made in the house by Representative Emerson, of Ohio.

The American aviators lost in Mexico for over a week are reported killed by bandits. Indians report seeing their dead bodies 20 miles northwest of the head of the Gulf of California.

The increasing number of automobile exhaust asphyxiations has prompted the bureau of mines to issue a warning against operating automobile engines in small garages with doors and windows closed.

Sherman L. Whipple, of Boston, a Democrat and a noted trial lawyer, is invited by the house rules committee to act as counsel in the peace note leak investigation, which, it now appears, will extend deeply into Wall street manipulations.

Change of name of the Danish West Indies to the "Dewey Islands," in honor of Admiral Dewey, was proposed in a joint resolution introduced by Representative Allen, of Ohio. Mr. Allen announced that he was submitting letters to President Wilson and to the foreign affairs committee of congress regarding the change.

That Thomas J. Mooney, who is on trial in San Francisco for murder, together with Alexander Berkman and others, were ringleaders in an anarchist conspiracy which threatened the life of President Wilson was charged by Assistant District Attorney Edward A. Cunha, in his opening statement to the jury which will try Mooney for murder as the result of a bomb explosion last July which cost 10 lives.

Profligacy and extravagance of the American people in pursuing pleasure were condemned in the senate by Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, in opposing proposals for an embargo on food products. The high cost of living, he said, was largely due to American extravagance, citing figures to show that Americans spend \$13,000,000,000 annually for liquor, tobacco, automobiles and "other amusements."

Tuesday was the coldest day of this year in Oregon.

Germany's food supply this winter is reported to be equal to that of the past two years.

Strikers and the Northwest ship-building plant at Portland have settled their differences and the men have gone back to work.

New York—Booker White, pastor of the Church of Social Revolution, author and college graduate, was indicted Wednesday, together with eight of his followers. They are charged with destroying an American flag last June in the yard of their church. Flags of many nations were burned. Mr. White formerly held several prominent Brooklyn pastorates.

Four army airplanes have crossed the border to search for the two lost aviators who have not been heard from for over a week.

Ways and means committee Democrats met Wednesday and informally agreed on a revenue program embracing a bond issue of \$289,000,000, an increase of the estate or inheritance tax to produce \$22,000,000 and an 8 per cent tax on excess profits above 8 per cent on capital of corporations and partnerships.

J. P. Morgan and other bankers are subpoenaed before the rules committee handling the "leak" resolution.

Cody, Wyo.—Plans for erection here of a life-size equestrian statue of Col. William F. Cody, (Buffalo Bill), who died a week ago in Denver, were launched by city officials.

Tuesday was the 72d birthday of Rear Admiral Charles D. Sigbee, who has been ill. He celebrated it by sitting up for breakfast and luncheon and reading congratulatory telegrams and letters. It was said that his condition was greatly improved.

The car shortage is reported from New York as 50 per cent better than it was in November.

Germany is invading a "home army" which includes every person in that country not in actual service.

The condition of ex-Queen Lilikalanani, of Hawaii, is again critical, according to advices received at San Francisco Wednesday from Honolulu. The ex-queen rallied from an indisposition some months ago, but is now suffering from a general breakdown due to advancing age, it is said. She was born in 1838.

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**APPLES IN STORAGE SCARCE**

Of 2000 Carloads for 1916 Season 350 Remain Unshipped.

Hood River—Out of 2000 carloads of apples produced by Hood River valley last season, a yield almost twice the tonnage of any former year, only about 350 carloads remain unshipped.

The Fruit Growers' Exchange has practically cleaned out its holdings, having shipped 150 carloads. A. E. Woolpert, of White Salmon, Wash., who represents in the mid-Columbia district the Dan Walle Co., an English importing firm, says that he has handled a tonnage of 175 carloads from mid-Columbia points, all but two of which have rolled to Eastern seaports for export.

The Apple Growers' association reported that approximately 350 carloads of extra fancy and fancy Newtowns and Spitzbergs, chiefly the former variety, remain in local storage.

**Has 500 Cars Fruit.**

Wenatchee—Shippers and dealers agree that there are in storage about 500 cars of apples in the valley. About 50 cars leave this district weekly for Eastern points, most of them back orders. Demand now is at a standstill. The holdings in the valley are well divided among the shipping agencies. It is not thought that any one has more than 75 cars.

It is thought that the movement to market will not be less than 50 cars a week, and on this basis the cleanup will be made by the latter part of April.

**Twenty-Cent Rise in Flour Market.**

Portland—There was an advance of 20 cents a barrel in the price of flour Thursday, all parts of the list being affected. The rise will put the wholesale quotation on family patents at \$8.40. This is the quotation that prevailed from November 13 to November 25, 1916. Later the market dropped off to \$7.80, but resumed its upward course on January 3. Flour has not sold higher than this quotation since early days. The market is strong and there is every indication of further advances in the near future.

**Egg Prices Are Steadily Climbing.**

Portland—Eggs sold higher Thursday, with the demand far ahead of the receipts. In the forenoon some business was done at 38 and 39 cents, but the bulk of the sales during the day were at 40 cents, case count. A few dealers asked a cent more.
