WINTER FESTIVAL HAS MANY FEATURES

Through the efforts of local citizens who have guaranteed the sale of season tickets for our winter festival will appear in Mosier February 13, 14 and 15. The committee gains nothing and has simply backed the plan in their public spirited attempt to secure for Mosier three days of high class entertainment. Will Build Concrete Walk and Steps

Through the co-operation of local citizens the embankment in front of the Church of Christ has been excavated.
