MOSIER TO ASSIST

In order to co-operate with the movement for all citizens at home in the United States to lend their support in furthering the cause of the Young Men's Christian Association among the troops while on duty, a meeting of local citizens was held Wednesday night in the Immanuel church to organize in assisting Wasco county as a district to combine efforts in a uniform plan that will alleviate the dull monotony of the soldier life and also provide ony of the soldier life and also provide an emergency fund to take care of ganize for this work.

Edward C. Pease, of The Dalles, in bringing the matter before the Mosier people, spoke as follows:

"The Y. M. C. A. has inaugurated a movement to raise \$3,000,000 to be expended among United States troops at the front. This is based on the supposition that 1,000,000 men will be called into the army. The idea is to construct a building for each division with dimensions 120 feet long and 40 feet wide, containing offices and club rooms, piano, phonograph, moving pictures, tables, newspapers, current literature, checkers, chess, and billiard games. All money over \$2,000, of which we expect to raise \$1500 in The Dalles, will be used for the emergency fund."


