## INVESTORS AWAIT ROAD BOND ISSUE

"Unless the \$5,000,000 bond issue for good roads is adopted at the June election, we will not invest one cent in property in Oregon," was the statement made by W. R. Reeves, of Santa Barbara, Calif., who accompanied his family and P. Moser and family in another automobile are touring the state of Oregon looking for a location. These people were en route to Endicott, Wash., to visit with friends and stated that they will anxiously await the decision of the people of Oregon on the good roads question.

"We like the soil and climatic conditions and think the scenery is the grandest in the world in Oregon, but that the Oregon roads are the meanest and most devilish that we have ever seen," continued Mr. Reeves. "After being used to the California roads we simply will not tolerate such roads as exist in Oregon. We have disposed of our business in California and desire to locate somewhere in Oregon. There are 50 people in my city who feel the same as we do regarding the Oregon roads and if the bond issue passes all this money is being invested in property holdings in this state. We sincerely hope that the people of Oregon realize the benefits of good roads not only to themselves but as an asset in drawing settlers from other parts of the country where huge sums of money is expended each year to build and maintain roads. Again, I say, we want to invest in Oregon, but we are awaiting the outcome of the calyx spray about the road bond issue."

**STATION MAKES SPRAY RECOMMENDATIONS**

In most parts of the Lower Valley it will be well to make plans for the application of the calyx spray about the first of June. In the case of early varieties such as Astrachans, Gravensteins, etc., this application can be made at an earlier date.

The calyx spray is an extremely important application for the control of both apple scab and codling moth. During the past week scab has put in an appearance on the foliage. Upon each one of the green fungus spots on the leaves are produced thousands of thousands of spores which with the coming of a little rain and wind are readily scattered and result in serious fruit infection unless everything is covered with the spray.

**GOOD ROADS POINTERS**  
"Better Roads Will Build Your Business Bigger" is the catchy good roads slogan coined by C. W. Walls, merchant and enthusiastic good roads booster of Fossil, Wheeler County.

In view of this expenditure what about a bond issue of \$5,000,000 for permanent roads? Some people will not believe these figures, but secure them for yourselves. The figures can be secured from different state and county officials.—Brownsville Times.

## APPLE AS FOOD HELPS WAR BONDS

The decision of Herbert C. Hoover, United States food administrator, that fruit is a food and a necessity was vital to the interests of the Mosier district. The Mosier community depends entirely upon its fruit raising industry, which by combined co-operation it has developed to the highest point of perfection. Had the decision been otherwise the growers would have been compelled to discontinue all orchard work and most disastrous results would have been apparent for ensuing years.

As stated by a grower, fruit is essential to the health of an army, and no fruit is more easily transported, will keep better, has the nutriment and the health giving qualities as has the apple.

Since the ruling of Mr. Hoover and Secretary of Agriculture Houston, the subscription for the war bond issue has received a stimulus and \$2000 additional was subscribed for on Saturday last.

This brings the total subscription from Mosier to over \$4000. It has been estimated that to cover the total amount of the Liberty Loan, subscriptions must equal six per cent of the bank deposits throughout the country. The amount already subscribed in Mosier is considerably in excess of the proportionate share based on these figures.
