PATRIOTIC TALKS AT RED CROSS RALLY

Although the attendance at the Red Cross rally Saturday night was not as large as the occasion demanded, the talk made by local speakers and Fred W. Wilson of The Dalles, were enjoyed by all present.

Next to the soldiers in the trenches there is nothing so important in this war as the Red Cross, said John P. Ross. "Our men who go to the battle-fronts will require more attention to alleviate the tremendous sufferings, and I look for a loyal and hearty response from the people in this community."

Some One must step to the front, when the bugle calls, Some One must fill up the breach when the foremost falls; Some One must carry the flag amidst rain of shot and shell,-- Some One must pay the toll, for this world's war is hell.

Some One must toil in the fields and some One must sow, And Some One must slay at home to lighten the deadly blow. Some One must make rifle and ball; Some One must build ships to roam the sea.

There is a part for each,--No One can shirk, 'tis a fight for Liberty. Some will never see home again, unknown graves, no mark for them; But the country's heart forever shall burn,-- They died for the love of men.

Some One must finish this fight that set the world aflame, And Some One must pay the toll with heartaches, toll and pain; Our allies are waiting beyond the seas,--their hope for success lies here,-- And all true sons, with Old Glory's big guns, makes them feel the end is near.

Some One must bind up the wounds and the scars in the danger zone, Some One must keep ceaseless watch instead of the loved ones at home. With all of our prayers and care, aye, millions can't make up our loss,-- Thank God we can give, so others may live, Humanity calls: Give to the Red Cross.

"Taking a mother's viewpoint, every man is some woman's son, and I know I speak for every woman in this community every sacrifice to those near and dear to us who have left or will leave their homes and businesses", said Mrs. C. J. Littlepage.

Lieut. W. H. Ellenburg emphasized the importance of Red Cross work, stating that the society is as large as the army, and each regiment has a Red Cross man in charge of the work. "Let all be soldiers when asked to do a thing, do it willingly. All can't fight. Those who can't, get into the spirit of the Red Cross work. Do it and be glad you are doing it."

"Prepare, that is the only way to support the Red Cross," declared Mrs. Robt. E. Shinn. "By giving liberally now efficient hospitals may be made ready to care for the wounded and dying and funds will be available for the widows and dependent children at home. We must do what we can and help to win the war."

Fred W. Wilson told of the perilous condition we are now facing, and showed the need for prompt action. He traced the history of the Red Cross and the wars. "You are not to be praised for giving to the Red Cross, you are only paying a premium on life and property. Do not wait for the casualty list to come in. Act now, do your part."

Mark A. Mayer, chairman of the evening, outlined the object of the meeting and stated that it was merely to break the ice for the big Red Cross drive of the week to follow.

MOSIER SUBSCRIBES \$5000 LIBERTY BONDS

Last week the report was made that Mosier had sent in subscriptions to the amount of \$4,600 for Liberty Loan bonds. On the last day additional bonds were subscribed for by the following parties:

In order to make up the balance of the \$5,000, the Mosier Valley Bank and Mark A. Mayer subscribed enough to make up the balance. This makes the total amount shows up well for Mosier, although it does not represent as many individual subscribers as it had been hoped to secure.

RED CROSS CARNIVAL PROMISES SUCCESS

The Mosier district as a whole have responded most liberally towards the Red Cross war fund, although our showing is not so good as the wheat growing districts, all things considered. Contributions have exceeded expectations by those who fully appreciate the needs of our soldier boys.

It seems certain that the Mosier district will raise \$750 for the Red Cross War Fund. As an impetus to get subscriptions, M. A. Mayer has offered to subscribe 25 per cent of the total subscription. At Mayerdale on Saturday night where Mark A. Mayer has generously opened his house and grounds at his beautiful country home, a Red Cross Carnival will be held. Music will be furnished by Company K, and Miss Annette Kerr will sing several solos. A tableau of Red Cross work will be put on by the soldiers. The grounds will be illuminated by a brilliant electrical display, the wire, lights and services of two men being donated for the cause by B. P. Bailey, manager of the Pacific Power & Light Co. at The Dalles. Booths of all sorts will be erected. A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend and help swell the Red Cross fund for the Mosier district.

FOREST SERVICE BUYS NEW LOOKOUT HOUSES

District Forester Cecil, of Portland, has just placed an order for material for three standard lookout houses to be erected at the summits of Mount McLaughlin, Diamond Peak and Rustler Peak on the Crater national forest, in July.

The main part of the building have windows running all the way around. The lower part of the house is the lookout man's living quarters, while the cupola contains the Osborne fire finder, camps, and other lookout equipment.

The success in quickly discovering forest fires from lookouts stationed on Mount Hood and other high peaks has turned the attention of foresters to this form of fire protection work. Messrs. Adams, on the Columbia forest, will have a lookout station on its summit this summer, as the material is all ready to be transported up the mountain.

V. W. Stephenson Buried at Hood River

The funeral services of the late V. W. Stephenson, an aged man who formerly resided at Mosier, was held in Hood River yesterday in charge of the Masonic lodge, interment following at Idlewild cemetery. The mind of Mr. Stephenson, who was a sufferer from a cure, became affected a little more than a year ago and he was taken to Hood River, where his fraternal brothers could look after him.
