ONE MOSIER MAN IN FIRST DRAFT

The name of Leslie O. Root, whose serial number is 924, is included in the list of those drawn on the first draft from Wasco county, his number being called on the 28th draw, and is the 36th person to be drawn on the county list.

The local exemption board, composed of Sheriff Levi Christman, County Clerk L. B. Fox and Dr. J. A. Reuter, planned to send out the official notices to the first 46 men on the county's draft list on Tuesday of this week.

INFORMATION FOR MEN UNDER DRAFT

Within a few days official lists of the draft serial numbers, showing the order in which they were drawn, in the lottery at Washington, will reach the various county exemption boards.

Until then it will not be necessary for those subject to call on the first draft to report. But as soon as they receive notification from their boards, they must report promptly on the day designated.

The first step taken by each board will be to post in a conspicuous place a list containing the names of all the men registered in its county or district, in the exact order in which they will be called on the first and all succeeding drafts.

Let it be emphasized again that this list will have only the names of the men to be called out on the first draft, but of every man registered, in the order in which he must be called. No person whatsoever has any authority to change this order.

After you have appeared before your county exemption board and passed the physical examination, it will still be some time before you will actually be called out to join the army. You will be notified when it is time for you to report for service.

HOOD RIVER EXEMPT ON THE FIRST CALL

The drawing of the serial numbers of men eligible to form the big national armies of Uncle Sam formed a bond of interest last Friday for 10,000,000 male citizens between the ages of 21 and 31, exclusive.

While Hood River men were drawn just as all other communities of the nation, no Hood River men, because the county's full quota has been furnished in volunteers and national guardsmen, will be taken on the first call.

FOREST FIRE WAS EVENT OF SUNDAY

A large portion of the male population of the city and from the Frankton district spent Sunday morning fighting a forest fire that swept up the Columbia gorge at Rutherford, and spread by a strong west wind, the fire flared rapidly, burning several hundred acres of the Stanley-Smith lumber Co. ranch and menacing a number of frame homes.

For the efforts of neighbors and local firemen, Clifton, the home of M. R. Noble, overlooking the Columbia, just west of Rutherford, would have been lost. Flashing through tinder-like underbrush and the dried moss that covers the rocky cliffsides, the flames at the very doorsteps were fought off by brigades of men and women. Kettles, water pails and every cooking utensil that would hold water was assembled from all parts of the neighborhood.

The fire, first discovered Saturday afternoon, started in two places near the Columbia, and spread rapidly. The flames simultaneously and many were extinguished. After fighters abandoned their work the strong wind evidently fanned into flame a smouldering brand.

Frank Ginger, C. T. Bennett and Geo. Chamberlain returned Tuesday night from a five days' trip into the interior of Oregon. They went as far as Redmond and Sisters and stated that the trip was made without mishap and that the roads proved to be in fine condition.

NEWS NOTES FROM CONUNTY AGENT

(By A. R. Chase)
Some of the results of an experiment by the Idaho Experiment Station to determine the effects of winter vs. summer pruning on yield and color are the following:

"On the basis of total production for the first seven crops, summer pruning has produced the greater yield in all varieties."
"With all red varieties of apples, under experimentation, the color was intensified as a direct result of summer pruning."

"The crop value per acre as determined by both color and yield shows an average gain in the three summer pruned plots over winter pruning as follows: Jonathan, \$32; Rome, \$53.64; and Wagener, \$30.69."
"The orchard used for the experiment was divided into two blocks containing approximately the same number of trees and the same varieties. The treatment of each block was the same in every respect except that in one the pruning was done in winter when the trees were dormant while the other was pruned only in the summer, just after the terminal buds had set.

A description of this experiment and its results are given in Bulletin 98 of the Idaho Experiment Station at Moscow, entitled "Winter vs. Summer Pruning of Apple Trees."
