Six-Tier Winter Nellis Sells for Two Dollars—Market Without Snap for Pears of All Kinds.

Rae & Hatfield, under date of November 5, issued the following letter:

Weather fine but colder. Good attendance at sale.

Offering of grapes today too much for the trade, and with the bulk showing more or less of condition, prices again declined on poor condition of stock. Good condition held fairly steady. Florin averaged \$1; Lodi, 81c. Cornichons were in liberal receipt and sold lower; Florin, \$1; Vacaville, 71c; Newcastle, 67c.

Pair of Emperor of Nellis in sale, those from Newcastle averaging 93c; Lodi, 81c. Exchange sold a car from Fresno, selling mostly \$1 to \$1.12. Car of Comice pears, Hillcrest brand, from Medford, sold from \$2.45 to \$3.40, mostly \$2.95 to \$3. Car of Winter Nellis from Washington, \$1.75. Car of B. Anjou and E. Blueres from Bellingham, mostly withdrawn few boxes of Anjou selling for \$2.75.

Car of Emperors from Miley ran very small and showed some stem rot, 99c. Two cars of Malaga sold to average \$1.75.

Cornichons from Newcastle, slack and poor condition, 70c. Florin and Mayhew Cornichons, \$1 to \$1.12.

Few Persimmons from Newcastle ranged from 80c to \$2.25, with an average of \$1.30. Quinces are a drug in the market, barrel stock being very cheap. Our average today for boxes, 88c.

Car of Emperors from Cloth ran small, some stem rot, sold mostly at \$1; Clusters, \$2.12. No demand for Emperors here yet. Cornichons are selling low, average 96c.

Malagas in good demand, there being only one car sold by Stewart, this averaging \$1.34.
