GOTHAM APPLE TRADE WEAKER

Western Apples Arrive, But Are Not Wanted—Fancy Reds Had Call Throughout Week.

(Mail Tribune Special Service.) NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Under excessive receipts and influenced to some extent by hot weather conditions, the apple market this week was weaker and prices for small and inferior fruit suffered a decline. The poor and ordinary kinds which have congested the market for some time, showed a slight increase this week, and as a result there was less vim and snap to trading than has been noticeable for some time.

Election day interfered to a considerable extent with the movement, and there were heavy accumulations on the dock from day to day. Most of the stock offered came from up-river sections, Albany county and Vermont. A considerable portion of the arrivals from western Nov. York and Missouri had to be put away in cold storage, as present prices would entail a loss to the owners were the stock placed on the market at this time.

Several cars of western box apples arrived, but they met with a dull demand and a poor outlet. The finest varieties did not bring over \$1 to \$1.75 per package. Fancy red soft table kinds had the call throughout the week.

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 12.—A bearing orchard of Wealthy apples at an altitude of 5950 feet is the success attending the efforts of Manager J. R. Wharton of the Columbia gardens, three miles southeast of Butte. This is probably the first crop of the fruit ever grown at this height above the sea level, according to the state horticulturists. The fruit is exceptionally fine.
