ESPEE WINS BIG PRIZE IN COURT

Railroad Company Practically Controls Destinies of Rich Imperial Valley in Southern California.

(United Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 15.—By a decision given by Judge Houser of the Los Angeles superior court, granting the Southern Pacific company judgment in the sum of \$1,405,927.33, that corporation is today in practical control of the destinies of the rich Imperial valley in Southern California.

Suit was brought by the Southern Pacific against the California Development company for payment on a number of promissory notes, given to the road by officers of the development company, with the consent of its directors. The money advanced on the notes, it was stated, was used to dam the disastrous flood of the Colorado river in 1904, when the Salton sink was filled and much of the development company's ground inundated.

At the time the money was borrowed the Southern Pacific company entered into a contract with the development company, which provided that the railroad corporation would appoint three members of the directorate of the development company, with the addition of naming the president. The president was empowered to appoint the executive officers and chief engineers employed by the company. In the suit which was decided late yesterday the development company alleged that the Southern Pacific entered into the agreement in order to control rich water rights which give it practical control of the valley.

John D. Works, counsel for the development company, refused to state whether further action in behalf of his client would be taken.

MAN INJURED IN BAD RUNAWAY

Mark Cross, Well-Known Timber Cruiser, Lies Unconscious in Rig While Team Plunges Down Grade.

(Mail Tribune Special Service.) CENTRAL POINT, Or., Nov. 15.—Mark Cross, a timber cruiser of Portland, who for the past two weeks has been employed with a number of other cruisers in estimating timber at the head of Trail creek, was the victim of a peculiar accident Wednesday of this week. As the party of cruisers were leaving the mountains preparatory to returning to Central Point, and finding that the severe cold made walking preferable to riding, all members of the party except the driver, went ahead of the team for some distance down the mountain. After quite a walk, Cross stopped and waited for the team, and after getting into the rig, a large fir tree fell alongside the road, many of the branches striking Cross about the head and face. The falling tree caused the team to take fright, and they were soon plunging madly down the mountain. Cross was thrown into the bottom of the rig in an unconscious condition and was bumped about by the team, receiving many other injuries that he escaped from the falling tree. After the team was finally caught Cross was brought on into Central Point, where he was given medical treatment. His injuries are painful, but not necessarily serious. Frank Hammond of Trail, the driver of the rig, escaped injury by jumping as he saw the tree falling.

Prosecuting Man Who Sold Liquor to Minors—Case Goes Over to Await Grand Jury.

Whipple, who conducts a saloon at Woodville. Mr. Whipple's action in causing the arrest of a violator of the law might be copied by other liquor dealers and would no doubt result in the curtailing of one of the greatest abuses connected with the sale of intoxicating liquors, that is, the furnishing of the stuff to young boys.
