## WASHINGTON AUTO LAW TO BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

(Mail Tribune Special Service) SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 16.—Four thousand dollars in fees, due to the state of Washington from owners of automobiles operating without numbers or with numbers which have not been paid for, will be swelled to \$200,000 in fines if the "tip" given to the police and constabulary by I. W. Howell, secretary of state, is followed up. The procuring of a state license is a matter of \$2, while the penalty for non-compliance with the law is a fine of \$100, to say nothing of court cost. Secretary of State Howell has requested the blue coats to keep a close watch for offenders and arrest and prosecute all owners of machines who are using old tags or driving without numbers. The policemen say it is no small matter to remember all the numbers in a list covering 20 to 25 closely type-written pages, and, as no arrests have been made so far, it is likely that other means will be adopted to force the autoists to take out licenses. In the meantime the joy-riders and owners without numbers are laying back, happy in the belief they have bested the state department.

## FAT CATTLE ARE IN GREAT DEMAND

Prices Have Been Good in Portland Market But Poor Quality Has Been Offered to Packers.

(Special Correspondence) PORTLAND, Nov. 16.—The receipts for the week have been 993 cattle, 45 calves, 2873 hogs, 349 sheep, 230 goats and 131 horses.

The very light run of cattle following the heavy receipts of poor quality stuff for the two preceding weeks has given the packers a chance to clear their pens to some extent and the demand can be said to be strong. The market has been active throughout the week, with good cows as the feature. Good fat cattle of every class are wanted.

The hog market has been active and strong. Prices have not ruled as high for all classes as two weeks ago. A good many lots sold for \$8 per hundred, but some hogs that would have sold for that price two weeks ago sold for \$7.75 to \$7.85. Good even, well fatted hogs are quotable at \$8 and the market generally can be said to be strong.

There have not been enough sheep to make a market, and there is a very active demand for fat wethers and lambs.

## FIRE PARTLY DESTROYED MARYSVILLE SUNDAY

(United Press Licensed Wire) MARYSVILLE, Cal., Nov. 16.—A fire which for a time threatened to wipe out the entire business section of the town broke out here at 10 o'clock Sunday and was not subdued until 2 o'clock this morning, when it had destroyed property valued at \$100,000.

The store buildings of F. S. Juch and H. D. King and the Peri building were completely wiped out. The S. C. King company and N. B. Moore lost heavily by water, as the result of their places being flooded. The fire is said to have been caused by a defective flue in the rear of the Juch grocery.

The loss is covered by insurance amounting to \$75,000.
