BRANCH EXCHANGES LEAGUE FOR FRISCO

Purpose of League is to Regulate Fluctuation of Value and Fix Value of Silver.

(United Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 17.—A branch of the Fair Exchange Leagues is to be formed in this city in the near future. The organization, which is international in scope, has for its object an adjustment of the monetary values between Oriental countries, the new world and Europe.

The movement here is being fostered by Colvin B. Brown, general secretary of the society, who formerly was the New York representative of the California promotion commission.

The first meeting will be held November 24, when the purchase purpose of the league will be explained by Morton Freeman of New York, a well-known writer on financial topics. It is the theory of the members of the leagues in this country and in Europe that the great fluctuation in value in Asia in a large measure responsible for financial panics, which periodically sweep around the world. They purpose to give silver a fixed value. This, they argue, will tend toward stopping the panics.

Ask United States to Interfere in Nicaragua With Rule of Zelaya.

(United Press Leased Wire.) BLUEFIELDS, Nicaragua, Nov. 16.—A petition is being circulated by those in sympathy with the revolution against President Zelaya demanding that the United States interfere in favor of the revolution, which the petition alleges is a result of the misrule of Zelaya. The petition reads:

"Right after the election of President Taft Zelaya's chief of police in Granada offered an insult to the American flag by taking it from the hands of a man who was waving it and casting it down as a miserable piece of trash on the streets."

SHORTS RAID METAL SHARES: LARGE DAMAGE TO PRICES

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The shorts raided the metal shares today, inflicting considerable damage to former prices. Amalgamated was swept backward and forward and finally closed with a decline of 1-1/8 points from yesterday. American smelter common was not quite so active, but nevertheless it showed a decline of several fractions at the end of the day. Anaconda dropped 5-8; steel common 3-4 and steel preferred 1 point. Toronto Steel & Iron was the only one to show a gain, closing with a mere fraction to its credit. Erie was active and showed liberal purchases. It closed with a net gain of 1-8 points above yesterday. Louisville & Nashville gained 1 point, Missouri Pacific 7-8 and Pennsylvania & Reading a similar amount.
