## DAIRYMEN ARE TO MEET IN PORTLAND

Large Attendance Is Assured—New Songbird to Be Liberated in This State in the Spring.

(Mail Tribune Special Service.) PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 18.—Oregon dairymen will meet in Portland December 9 and 10, and plans already under way for the gathering indicate it will be one of the most interesting conventions in the history of the association. There will be a large attendance of dairymen from both Washington and Oregon, and a fine lot of exhibits of dairy products.

One prominent creamery will exhibit over 50 kinds of cheese gathered from all over the world. This showing is bound to be of very great interest.

T. B. Wilcox, president of the Portland Flouring mills, has offered prizes of \$65 and \$35 for the best exhibits of dairy products at the convention and competition for the prizes will be keen.

The program as now planned is an excellent one. Among the most prominent speakers will be Mr. Rawl of Washington, D. C., chief of the dairy division of the department of agriculture, who will be in attendance. Others of note will speak.

The convention will be held in the W. O. W. hall on Eleventh street, near Alder. Attendance promises to be unusually large because of the fact that the Oregon State Horticultural society holds its annual meeting just before the dairymen's convention and many will attend both gatherings.

Manchurian larks, entirely new songbirds for this country, will be liberated in Oregon next spring, being the first of this species ever brought to America. Mrs. Fred D. Fisher, wife of the American consul at Niu Chwang, Manchuria, who returned to America last week with her husband, brought back 15 of the birds. She will keep them through the winter and liberate them in the spring. The imported songsters are rated as among the best song birds in the world. They are about the size of the native lark, but are the color of the wren. The Chinese keep them in cages in their homes.

The State Threshermen's association has its annual convention in prospect on December 2 and 3 at The Dalles. There is a prize offer of \$200 for the best bushel of wheat grown in the state, offered by Phillip S. Bates, secretary of the association.

Judges in this contest have been named as follows: Professor H. D. Scudder, agronomist at the Oregon Agricultural college, and J. W. Gannon, vice-president of the Portland flouring mills. Addresses of note are on the program. Professor Phil S. Rose, Madison, Wis., will lecture on the use of gasoline power on the farm, and Byron Hunter of the department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., will speak on the selection of seed wheat and the organization of seed growers' association. The government good roads work will be represented and other speakers will tell of the threshing industry in this state. The business men of The Dalles will give the threshermen a banquet at The Dalles hotel.

## GOSSIPING WOMEN CAUSE DEATH OF NOBLEMAN

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 18.—Edward Von Buelow, a first cousin of Prince von Buelow of Germany, committed suicide because he was accused of marrying an octopus. Von Buelow was arrested a week ago, charged with violating the law, which prohibits the intermarriage of whites with negroes.

He was released on bond and three days ago disappeared. His body was found late yesterday floating in the Mississippi river. Before ending his life Von Buelow sent a message to the district attorney in which he stated that he would be out of the jurisdiction of the court when his case was called.

Von Buelow came to New Orleans six years ago. In 1902 he married a young woman who posed as a widow. She bore him two children. The rumor that she was "off color" reached the authorities through gossip of local women.

(United Press Leased Wire.) HONOLULU, Nov. 18.—Governor Walter F. Frear is en route to the United States today on the steamer Lurline, which left this port yesterday. Governor Frear will go to Washington to confer with the government officials in various departments in regard to the Hawaiian affairs.

One of the principal reasons for his journey is to secure favorable action of congress on the amendments to the organic act of Hawaii. The act was recently passed at a special session of the territorial legislature.

While in the east governor Frear probably will confer with Andrew Carnegie and complete arrangements for a Carnegie library in Honolulu.
