

VOLCANO SPREADS TERROR IN SPAIN

Inhabitants Flee Before Rivers of Molten Lava—Aid Is Dispatched to Sufferers.

(United Press Leased Wire.) MADRID, Nov. 19.—Mount Saleres is in active eruption today and is belching forth vast quantities of boiling lava, threatening destruction to the island of Tenerife, one of the Canary group.

Terror stricken, the inhabitants of the towns in Oratava valley are fleeing to the coast for their lives.

Steamers have been ordered to Tenerife from African and Spanish ports to aid the refugees.

The eruption is growing in violence hourly. Torrents of lava are pouring down the quaking mountain sides and threaten to over-run the entire valley. Towns directly in the path of the molten stream are Guia, Icod and Tanquehilo. All of them have been deserted by the inhabitants who fled without stopping even to pack provisions.

TO RENAME THE OREGON CAVES

Will G. Steel Takes Up Matter for Oregon Geographical Board—Trying to Find Suitable Name.

Will G. Steel who has done so much to make Crater Lake prominent, and who has always been interested in the scenic beauty of southern Oregon, and who is a member of the state historical board, has now taken up the matter of the Josephine County caves and is writing letters to the different commercial bodies of southern Oregon to supply a permanent name for them.

By some they are known as the Oregon Caves, but this name has no significance as it does not imply what part of Oregon they are in. Others call them the "Marble Halls."

Mr. Steel has addressed the Grants Pass Commercial Club as follows: Secretary Commercial Club, Grants Pass, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—There will be a meeting of the Oregon Geographical Board in the near future, at which time the matter of a name for the caves in Josephine county will be considered and we will appreciate knowing the sentiment of your club.

We have had several petitions on the subject, and the following names have been offered: "Oregon Caves," "Josephine County Caves," "Davidson's Caves" and "Marble Halls of Oregon."

We would also appreciate a historical sketch of the naming of Grants Pass for our records.
