STOCK MARKET GETS SETBACK

Fear of Bad Bank Statement Led to Severe Setback of Market.

(United Press League Wire)
 NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—The stock market received a severe setback because of the fear of a bad bank statement with a heavy increase in loans and decreased reserves.
 Utah copper was very active and very early in the day advanced from 63 to 67½. Later in the day with the heavy selling in the general market Utah dropped back to 62½ but later went back to 64½. Even this is an advance of 2½ points above yesterday's closing.
 Reading shares were served in much the same shape. The market went to 169½ at the opening and climbed to 171. Liquidation in the general market forced it back to 169½ and it closed ¼ point above this or 1½ points lower than yesterday.
 The generalist's bill of embezzlement from traders at any time and the closing was heavy.
