NO LIVES LOST LISBON STORM

Tidal Wave Swept Over City But No Loss of Life Has Been Reported This Afternoon.

(United Press Leased Wire.) LISBON, Portugal, Nov. 20.—Reports coming in slowly from the coast section, struck yesterday by the hurricane which swept this city and the tidal wave that followed, indicate heavy damage to shipping interests. Reports of loss of life have not been confirmed, though several small vessels are still unreported. One fishing vessel is reported to have been swamped. It was definitely learned this afternoon that no loss of life was sustained in this city by the hurricane and tidal wave of yesterday. A search was made of the demolished structures in the lower part of the city and it was found that all employees in the stores and shops had escaped. They had fled to places of safety before the worst of the storm broke.

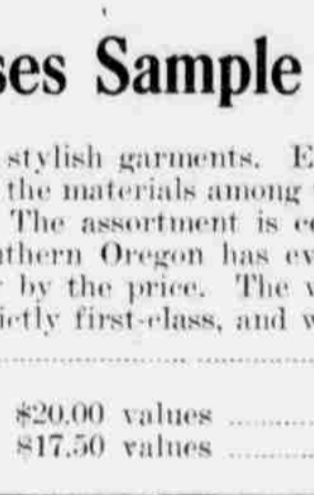

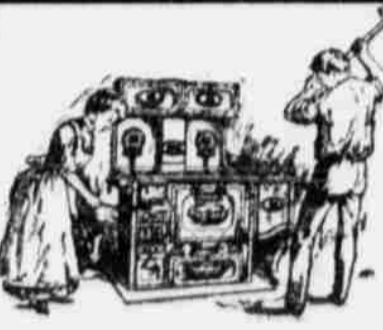
