HONOR IS FOR ALL OREGON.

The Portland Oregonian missed a good chance to advertise Oregon and Oregon apples by failing to give prominence in its news columns to the Spokane Apple Show and its awards. Had some fruit from near Portland carried off the honors, instead of Rogue river; there would have been a first page top head story and a cartoon of the Oregon apple king, instead of a two-inch item buried under a small head in the inside columns.

But the Oregonian never did give proper space to Southern Oregon, and has only recently discovered the existence of this locality, and one learns far more of this region from papers outside the state. However the Oregonian makes partial amends for its oversight in the following editorial squib:

"After all, the city detectives are not without sympathy. Without their stoop-pigeons they would be unable to find crooks and could not hold their easy jobs. With winter confronting them, the detectives would be in sorry plight."

The Portland Journal, which has always been fairer to Southern Oregon and aided materially in its development, gave much more prominence to the apple show news and award and the following editorial mention:

"The apple king of the world," as decided by the judges of the apple show at Spokane is an Oregon man, or two men in partnership, Tronson and Guthrie, of Eagle Point, Jackson county. They exhibited a carload of Spitzenbergers that won a \$1000 prize and a gold medal. The Rogue River valley is getting a great reputation and deserves it."

That the honor belongs to all of Oregon is appreciated nowhere more than at Hood River, as shown by the following dispatch from that city:

"Several Hood River apple growers who were in attendance at the National Apple Show at Spokane, returned today, greatly elated because the Rogue River car of Spitzenbergers, grown at Eagle creek, took the Elliott and sweepstakes prize at the Spokane show. In discussing the matter one of the most prominent growers said that the Rogue River exhibit won the prize on merit, notwithstanding that the carload of apples went to Spokane under the same handicap that it was proposed the Hood River car should go."

AN APPLE SHOW EDITION.

The Sunday Mail Tribune made a decided hit yesterday. A thousand extra papers were printed and the supply was insufficient to go around.

The Mail Tribune press is being rebuilt. It was thrown together temporarily long enough to print the Sunday issue. Consequently the press work was abominable. The press is again dismantled and the paper must appear in abbreviated form for a few days longer.

To satisfy the demand the Mail Tribune will print next Sunday an edition of several thousand copies, containing a complete story of the Spokane Apple Show and its awards, together with cuts of the Tronson & Guthrie orchard and exhibits at Spokane. The press work will be good, the reading matter better, and it will be a paper worth while, and a great booster edition for the valley.

As it will be necessary to print in sections, those wanting extra copies should notify the office at once, and advertisers wanting space should have copy in by Thursday.

That the Spokane Apple Show gave everyone a square deal is evidenced by the awards. When Spokane does anything, it does it right.

TELEPHONE SAVES LIFE OF JAILER

Was Fast Getting Under Influence of Gas When Constant Ringing Awakens Him.

PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—William E. Robson, night city jailer today owes his life to the persistent ringing of a telephone. The man, who arrested him from a stupor produced by inhaling gas. The wife was at the residence of her mother yesterday where she and her husband were to take dinner. Alarmed at the loudness of her husband's snoring, Mrs. Robson called him over the telephone. Robson, usually asleep at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, was still a snoring at 3 o'clock.

"I heard the telephone bell ringing and it seemed to me I was dreaming," said Robson. "The ring was so insistent that I finally awakened partially and detected the odor of gas. This alarmed me and I realized that I was almost under its influence. I jumped up and opened a window, but felt weak and was so fatigued I could hardly keep my faculties about me."

Upon investigation made in the basement was found bursted and gas escaping in great quantities.
