FOREIGN LANDS ASK OF MEDFORD

Commercial Club is Receiving Inquiries From Every Section of the Known Globe.

Inquiries are pouring in by the score to the secretary of the Commercial Club with every mail, from practically every inhabited portion of the globe, asking for information concerning the Rogue River valley in general and Medford in particular. Scotland, England, Hawaii, Japan, China, Germany, France, Italy, even India and South Africa have seekers for information concerning Southern Oregon.

Over 500 inquiries a month are answered either by sending the printed booklet, or by personal letter, and this is exclusive of lists sent in from the other commercial clubs of the state, or orders filled for Medford citizens.

The photographs of southern orchard scenery, including orchards and natural scenes of this section, including the 20 foot photograph of the greatest of all natural wonders, Crater Lake, which were on exhibition at the Alaska-Yukon exhibition and the Spokane National Apple Show, have been shipped to Chicago, where they will be shown at the Chicago Live Stock exhibition and afterwards in one of the big show windows of Marshall Field's store.

Secretary Connel states that a great majority of the inquiries from people of the United States, in answer to the booklets and advertising matter sent out come from the middle western states and most of them from Chicago and its environs.

With the issuance of a new booklet in the spring together with the sending of the sweepstakes in apples at Spokane, he figures that there must either be some over-time work for the staff of the commercial club or more help added.

brought out, is in a critical condition and there is little hope for him. While the joy and celebrating is general, there is no disrespect for the sorrow that has smitten down irremovably upon the home of twenty-three men whose dead bodies have been identified.

Fifty dead bodies have been taken out of the mine and of those there is not much hope of identifying more than the twenty-three who already have been recognized.

Excitement Intense.
The excitement here following the announcement that men were being taken out of the St. Paul mine above is so intense and the people are so sure in their demonstrations that it is almost impossible to get any absolutely accurate account at this time as to how many have been taken out alive and how many are still alive within the mine, though it is certain that between six and fifty hundred of the imprisoned men are safe. When Mrs. George Smith saw her husband alive, she fell in a wild delirium of joy and had to be overpowered. Other women threw themselves upon the ground and kissed the feet of the rescuers. The crowd swept away the guards and surged about the shaft, with irrepressible frenzy.

Among the rescued ones, John Crossman, John Anson, Frank Barman, John Sonch and William Hynesius.

"This is my second experience," said Hynesius. "I was buried sixteen hours and was in the Marquette mine last year."

Soldiers Joined Celebration.
The soldiers and the officers who have been deeply moved by the horror of the situation, joined in the expressions of joy and it appeared impossible for a time to restore order.

Mention the rescuers were hastily engaged in bringing the survivors to the surface.

The first two men brought to the surface were Joseph Pigatti and his brother, Salvatore Pigatti. Joseph said they had plenty of food in their
