

BELIEVE FLOOD SITUATION PAST

Thought That Great Northern Will Soon Be Able to Get Its Trains Back on Schedule.

(United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 24.—With the cessation of the heavy rainfall of the past few days, it is believed today that the worst of the flood situation in the Cascade mountains, which has tied up the Great Northern railroad, is past.

Officials of the railroad state, however, that it will probably require a week or ten days to repair the tracks and rebuild the bridges that have been washed out by the mountain torrents.

Several passenger trains on the Great Northern were caught and are being held by the washouts at different points in the mountains and some anxiety has been expressed for the welfare of the passengers, owing to the probable shortage of provisions.

The trains have been stalled for more than 24 hours and relief trains are being sent out from Spokane with food supplies for the stranded passengers.

Officials of the company have decided to send no more trains through the Cascade tunnel for the present because of the fear of a possible cave-in and work trains have been sent out from Spokane to repair the damage to the track on the east end of the mountain division.

Work trains also are being sent eastward from Everett. Telegraph wires and poles for several miles through the mountain districts have been carried away by the roaring mountain streams, many of which have overflowed their banks.
