MEDFORD CLOSE SECOND SPOKANE

Spokane Has \$320 on Deposit for Every Man, Woman or Child—Medford Has \$312.

(Special Correspondence) SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 24.—Bankers claim that the deposits in Spokane are larger per capita than in any other city of the 100,000 class on the continent, if not in the world. Responding to the call of the comptroller of currency, they report total deposits of \$29,929,755.66, to which should be added \$2,500,000 in the Bank of Montreal, a non-reporting bank, or more than \$320 for every man, woman and child in the city, at the close of business on November 16. This is a gain of \$816,956 over the deposits reported on September 8, 1909. The banks have \$12,527,156.13 in cash on hand and in banks, \$18,845,169.29 in loans and discounts and \$1,793,685.29 in surplus and undivided profits. The report to the comptroller of currency does not include the deposits in the Bank of Montreal, which is a foreign corporation controlled by British capital.

Medford, with 5500 people, has bank deposits aggregating \$1,717,500, or over \$312 for every man, woman and child.
