

# NO SOONER SELLS THAN BUYS AGAIN

### S. S. Hathaway of Central Point Buys Thirty-one Acres of the Coe Property.

S. S. Hathaway of Central Point, who recently sold his property near that city, has reinvested in Rogue River Valley property by purchasing 31 acres of the east end of the Coe property near Central Point from H. T. Hull and George L. Treichel at a consideration of \$9000.

The place purchased by Mr. Hathaway was purchased by Messrs. Hull and Treichel 18 months ago for \$2000 an acre. Since then they have cut six profitable crops of alfalfa from it. They then sold the property at an advance of 50 per cent—just an example of what Rogue River land is doing.

Mr. Hathaway recently sold his place of 20 acres near Central Point, for which four years ago he paid \$900, for \$12,000. In the meantime he had planted out young trees. So well did he profit by this experience that he immediately reinvested.

### DEBS ORDERED TO ASSIST FIGHT IN SPOKANE

(United Press Lensed Wire.) SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 24.—Eugene V. Debs will be ordered to drop his contemplated trip to Los Angeles and come to Spokane immediately to assist in the fight for free speech. A telegram received here by counsel for the Industrial Workers from Editor Warren, of the Appeal to Reason, at Giorard, Kan., stated that Debs would undoubtedly come within a few days. With a small force the Industrialists are still working their fight against the police. The city jail is filled with prisoners but room for 2000 more is available in the Fort Wright guardhouse, and the abandoned Franklin school, which are being used for jails.

### Triffac Suffers.

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 24.—The service of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound railroad west of Missoula is completely demoralized by at least half a dozen landslides. Tons of earth and rock have covered the tracks many feet deep. Freight movement is at a complete standstill.

The Northern Pacific railroad also is encountering great difficulty in operating their trains on account of landslides brought about by continued rains in the mountains of Western Montana and Idaho.

### Engineer Killed.

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 24.—Engineer O. R. Meacham is dead today and Fireman H. H. Byrd and Brakeman H. C. Brown are seriously injured as the result of a Northern Pacific engine rolling down a 50-foot embankment.

The accident, which occurred yesterday, was caused by the freight train crashing into a landslide near Iron Mountain.

### Rogue Goes Down.

The water today is rapidly receding in Rogue river and no further damage is expected if the rain storm breaks. No damage was done at Gold Ray other than the washing away of logs. At the Ament dam probably \$2500 worth of damage was done when the huge pumps were carried out.

Railroads have resumed their regular schedules and aside from soft tracks, no damage has been done.
