Strang, in the last part of the game, with the ball on Central Point's three yard line, went through and blocked the kick and incidentally took part of the kick, putting him temporarily out. In the first half Peart of Central Point got mixed up in the bottom of the pile and came out with a broken rib. Nobody knew it, though, except the plucky player, until the half was over. Two touchdowns from which a goal was kicked in each instance was Medford's score in the first half, and a touchdown and a goal in the last.
