

LEADERS TALK OF SITUATION

Iowa Leader Talks With President Regarding Joe Cannon and His Standing in West.

(United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 27.—Former Senator Lacey of Iowa, a strong anti-Cummins man, discussed with President Taft today the western political situation, especially with reference to the activities of the so-called insurgents and the attitude of Speaker Cannon toward them.

"All efforts to dissatisfy the farmers and others who are prospering in the west by the insurgents will fail," he said. "The people out in my section are thoroughly in accord with Speaker Cannon and they are living in an era of prosperity unprecedented in the history of the middle western states."

"The Iowa Republicans will rebuke Senator Dooliver and Cummins, said Murdoch, representative from Kansas, and leading insurgent. "We are Republicans and cannot not read us out of the party. We will be Republicans when Cannon is forced to retire from public life, which will take place early next spring."

"As soon as congress opens we will circulate a petition among all Republicans asking for signatures demanding of Cannon recognition for a Republican to present a resolution requesting a committee to revise the house rules. If we cannot get a majority of the Republicans to sign this petition we will turn to the Democrats for help. The fight is on and will be waged to the end."

Speaker Cannon's speech at Kansas City, in which he first disclaimed purpose to read the Republican mid-western insurgents out of the party, later extended to them a vigorous invitation to get out, and finally wound up by declaring they would have to be fought just as Bryan must be fought, is accepted as the definite taking up of the gauge of battle.

"I do not intend to carry on this discussion through interviews," said Senator Cummins. "At the proper time and in the proper way I shall have something to say, but it is not possible to make a statement that would do justice to the situation in an interview."

RESOLUTION AND CHARTER AMENDMENT

Be it resolved, by the city council of the city of Medford:

Section 1. That there is hereby proposed to and submitted to the legal voters of the city of Medford for approval or rejection the following proposed amendment to the charter of said city, to-wit:

A charter amendment to the charter of the city of Medford, Oregon, amending sub-section 42 of section 25 and section 100 of said charter giving the time for which contracts may be entered into and franchises be granted by said city.

The people of the city of Medford do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That sub-section 42 of section 25 of the charter of Medford be amended so as to read as follows: 42. No franchise or contract shall be granted by the city or city council for a longer period than ten years, except street railway franchises, which may be granted for such period as the council or legal voters of said city may see fit.

Section 2. That section 100 of the charter of said city of Medford be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 100. No contract shall be entered into by the city, or any franchise granted by it, for a longer period than ten years, except franchises for street railways, which may be granted for such periods as the city council or voters of said city may see fit. No franchise shall grant any exclusive right or rights.

Section 2. Be it further resolved, That said charter amendment be so proposed and submitted to the voters of said city as aforesaid at a special election called and to be held in said city on the 14th day of December, 1909, and that the recorder of said city cause said proposed charter amendment to be printed, published and posted in conformity with ordinance No. 124 of said city.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council of the city of Medford on November 27, 1909, by the following vote: Merrick aye, Welch aye, Wortman aye, Elfert aye, Demmer aye, Emerick aye.
