Pierce made a hard fight to avoid coming to trial, having carried the case to the United States supreme court in his contest against extradition.

He is known as one of the most prominent oil magnates in the country and is alleged to have been allied with the standard Oil company in many of its deals.

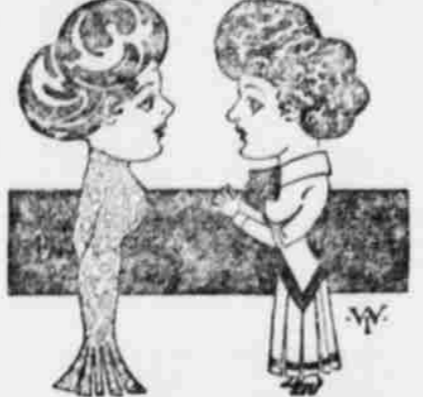

Net Profit.



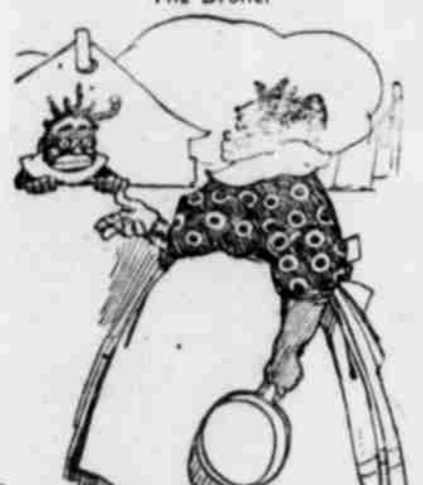
