## SUPPLY IS NOT EQUAL TO DEMAND

### Fair to Good Steers at Portland Stockyards Bring \$4.65 a Hundred.

UNION STOCKYARDS, Portland, Or., Nov. 29.—Receipts for the week were 3019 cattle, 306 calves, 1483 sheep, 3138 hogs and 63 horses. A big share of the cattle receipts came in after Thanksgiving and because of the usual conditions following a holiday a feeling of apathy has prevailed in the cattle market. The demand during the entire week was not as snappy as the week before, but a clearance of practically all the offerings have been effected. Fair to good steers brought \$4.65. The demand for cows has been somewhat more active than for steers, with sales of the best at \$3.70. Good, light calves have brought good prices and the supply has not equalled the demand.

The sheep receipts have continued light, consisting mostly of shipments in transit. The demand for fat mutton ethers and lambs has not met with anything like appropriate offerings.

The hog market has shown unexpected strength throughout the week—anything that looked like a good car of hogs sold for \$8.10, and there has been no trouble on the part of sellers in disposing of what they had to offer. The top price seems to have been fixed at \$8.10, and nearly all the sales of good hogs were made at that figure.

## MRS. LAW FORCED TO PAY DUTY ON GOODS

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Mrs. Geo. Law, one of the most noted American women in society in London and Paris and a close friend of Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish and Mrs. Potter Palmer, is the latest person to have her trunk sent to the customs house under the new ruling of Collector Loeb.

Mrs. Law, who has lived abroad almost continuously since the death of her husband in 1896, arrived in New York today. Under the previous rulings a person who maintained a residence abroad for two years and lives there, although he or she made a trip to this country, their effects were not subject to duty here, and many families returning brought back with them goods to the value of thousands.

## FIND SKELETONS OF INDIANS 200 YEARS OLD

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 29.—More than a dozen skeletons unearthed by workmen excavating for a heating plant on the site of the famous "Old Palace" of Santa Fe were pronounced today by archaeologists to be relics of the Indians who occupied this historic pueblo 200 years ago.

The skeletons indicated that the natives were huge in stature. Many implements of primitive warfare lay in the ruins.

Local savants who took possession of the skeletons advanced the theory that they were the remains of prisoners taken in war by the Santa Fe Indians, who had been killed and buried beneath the palace by their captors.
