ASHLAND GETS BETTER BUTTER

After Long War Ashland Residents at Last See Chance to Get Something Worth While.

The people of Ashland are rejoicing over the invasion of the local market of the famous "Hazelwood" butter, this product having appeared only this week in competition with the alleged first-class butter made at the local creamery. All of last summer and up to last week, the grocers of Ashland persisted in handling Ashland creamery butter exclusively, in spite of the complaints of their customers against the quality of the article. Some of the lovers of good butter were forced to send to Scott Valley, Siskiyou county, for butter, while others continued to try to eat the Ashland creamery product that the grocers were forcing upon them. Local pride sustained the Ashland creamery in its imposition on the public for many months, but patience finally ceased to be a virtue, and the pressure on the grocers became so strong that they were forced to resort to what is practically a boycott of the local creamery.

What has exasperated the Ashland butter-eaters to the limit is the fact that the local creamery can make the finest butter on the coast when its managers are so inclined, their product having taken the gold medal at the Lewis and Clark fair for quality, and yet for months past the great bulk of butter offered to local consumers has tasted like cheap tub butter worked over. Just why the creamery management should be so indifferent to the local trade does not appear, unless it be that the demand from outside points for the butter really made by them is so great that they are independent of the local market.

STUBBS AND CLUB CLASH

Kansas Governor Withdraws Because Liquor is Kept for Use of Members in Locker System.

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 2.—Governor Stubbs will not speak tonight at a banquet at the Topeka club, this city's most exclusive organization, for the reason that the board of directors refused to permit the governor to be entertained within the walls of the building.

Governor Stubbs was scheduled to speak at the banquet to be given in honor of Chief Justice Johnson by Den Valentine, clerk of the supreme court. The board of directors notified Valentine that the invitation to the governor must be withdrawn.

Governor Stubbs formerly was a member of the club, but withdrew because the directors would not abolish the locker system for keeping liquor at the club house.
