PRECOOLING OF

Experiments Conducted in Iowa Show Best Results-May Be Generally Adopted.

Experiments at the Iowa experiment station have thoroughly demonstrated that partly colored fruit does not have as good keeping qualities as hard, ripe, highly colored fruit. The flavor and texture, as well as the general attractiveness and market value. o fthe immature fruit did not equal that of the better colored fruit.

That fruit should be stored immediately after picking is emphasized in a recent bulletin on this subject, issued by the Iowa experiment station. Any method of handling the fruit that hastens the ripening after 32 1/2 c. it is picked shortens the period of commercial value, no matter where the fruit is stored. Any treatment that checks the ripening prolongs the marketing period. The growth of an apple is stopped when it is picked. After this time the ripening processes are hastened and progress more rapidly than they do when the frruit is growing on the tree, even in the same temperature. The rapidity of this ripening process increases in a high temperature and is retarded in a low temperature. Early varieties, therefore, ripen much faster after picking than do the later winter sorts, and should be hastened to the storage house as soon as possible.

Any delay between harvesting and storing is at the expense of the keeping quality of the frruit. The extent of this loss depends upon several things. The most common of these are the temperature during the period of delay and the condition under which the fruit is held, whether is piles in the orchard, in tight buildoff rapidly, or in transit in tight cars. A wrapper serves to reduce the bruising that may result from poor @ \$1.35; Concords, 121/2 @ 15c; huckpacking, or from rough handling in Heberries, Sc. transportation. It retards shriveling, and adds to the value of the fruit by preserving the attractive appearance, and the fruit will sell better on the market than if unwrapped. Wrappers cost about 20 cents per thousand. The wrapping of the late winter sorts has very little advantage, except for the fancy trade, as it does not materrially add to the keeping qualities of the fruit, but with the earlier sorts a wrapper has a distinct advantage in extending the life of the fruit, preserving its natural brightness and lessening the amount of de-
