ALL HOPE GONE FOR J. R. WALSH

Motion for New Trial Is Denied—Supreme Court Alone Stands Between Him and Jail.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—The United States circuit court today denied a motion for a new trial for John R. Walsh, the former financial king, and he was put in the custody of the marshal.

Only the supreme court of the United States now stands between the man who is a physical wreck and the doors of the penitentiary. The former financier and magnate seemed utterly crushed when the decision was handed down. He has been failing rapidly of late.

Walsh will be held in custody, it is understood, until January in order to allow his attorneys to file a motion for a writ of certiorari to the supreme court.

This man who was the head of the Chicago National bank and promoter of many big financial institutions, has fought hard and made one of the most remarkable struggles on record to save himself from the state prison.

The issue has now gone against him. The issue has now gone against him in every instance and only one thin thread of hope is left. Even his friends this afternoon say they are unable to see much chance now for him to escape the penitentiary sentence.

When the Walsh financial structure collapsed, this city received one of the greatest shocks in its history. He had been prominent in all lines of activity and was one of the very foremost men of the city. The investigations revealed misuse of the money deposited in his bank and various crimes of high finance were charged against him.
