NO CHANGE IN CATTLE MARKET

Hogs Offered in Liberal Quantity at the Portland Stock Yards During Past Week.

PORTLAND, Dec. 6.—Receipts at the Portland Union stockyards have been: Cattle, 1877; calves, 295; sheep, 1408; hogs, 4650; horses, 37, and goats, 126.

The cattle market has shown little or no change from preceding weeks, except that the light receipts gave packers a chance to lower their supplies and in consequence the demand can be said to have been more active. There was little or no change in prices. Top steers sold for \$4.76; top cows sold for \$4.70; a good load of hoppers brought \$4.75. The demand for light calves continues strong; tops at \$5.25.

The sheep market continues active, with the supply not up to the requirements of the market. Good wethers have brought \$4.75 this week and fair quality lambs brought \$5.50.

Hogs have come forward in liberal quantity and buyers have taken on them as fast as they have arrived at good strong prices. Anything that was weighty and smooth sold for \$8.10, while three loads sold for \$8.25. This is the high point for hogs on this market.
