BRUSSELS, Dec. 8.—In spite of the official bulletin issued early today stating that King Leopold's condition is improving, it is believed is dying.

Leopold is suffering from a paralytic attack, which, unless cured, threatens to render him absolutely helpless. In view of his advanced age, 74 years, little hope of his recovery is entertained today. His nephew, Prince Albert, is the heir presumptive.
