NUMEROUS SPILLS TAKEN BY BICYCLE RIDERS

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—As a result of the numerous spills during the night, the six reading teams in the six-day grind at Madison Square Garden are about five miles behind the previous record today.

While the secretary, Miss Helen Coburn Heath, insists that they were shut out for no personal reason, but because the membership was growing too large. The Jewish population consider the matter in the light of a personal affront.
