JAPANESE TALK OF KOREAN SITUATION
 TOKYO, Dec. 13.—More than 1300 Tokyo politicians and journalists met to discuss the Korean problem. The spirit of the assembly was distention from the accepted government policy which was branded as "luke-warm."

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 13.—The school census for this year of the Klamath Falls district, which includes the names of all between the ages of 4 and 20 years, shows a total of 672. There are more, but many young married people would not admit to the census taker that they are not yet beyond the school age. At least a dozen married women are on the roll.
