Roe & Hatfield State That This Season's Crop is Nearly All Sold.

Roe & Hatfield say: Minnowawa brand Emperors in the Eshel were mostly good size and color, but showed considerable stem rot, clusters selling \$1.75 to \$1.87 1-2; Buncle pack, \$1.12 1-2 to \$1.50. Others ranged from 50c to \$1 with an average of \$1.10 to rifle car.

Persimmons in this car were small and sold for \$1.50. Earl's car from Klink consisted of Tokays and Emperors; Tokays in rotten condition selling for 40c. Emperors were good size and color, fresh and good condition, selling \$1.25 to \$1.50.

Offering tomorrow will consist of three cars, of which we will have two, one car of Emperors, one car of pears. Thurston company will have one car of Emperors. This will probably wind the deciduous fruit season up for 1909.
