## USED MAILS TO DEFRAUD VICTIMS

### Englishman Faces Maximum Penalty of Six Years for Using United States Mails to Defraud.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 16.—Edward H. Stubbley today faces a maximum sentence of six years in prison for having used the mails to defraud. He was found guilty on four counts in the federal court late yesterday, the penalty on each count being 18 months' imprisonment. Stubbley, who is an Englishman, with a police record in several coast cities in both the United States and British Columbia, was convicted of having abstracted letters to guests in rooming houses and writing appeals in the name of the person addressed to relatives and friends for money, claiming the person was ill and in a destitute condition. He would then obtain the letters containing the money or checks and keep the proceeds.

Miss Eva Mahoney of Toronto, Can. testified yesterday that she received a letter purporting to have been written by a friend in behalf of her uncle, Frank Gaugh. She said she sent the money asked. Gaugh testified he was not responsible for the letter and received no money. Several other young women, brought here from various parts of the country, also testified to similar facts, all stating that they received appeals for funds purporting to be in the interests of relatives who were said to be ill and in financial straits.

On the stand Stubbley admitted that he had served a penitentiary sentence at Walla Walla and one jail sentence in British Columbia.
