MARRY CHRISTMAS CATTLE ARE SOLD

History Making Record Prices Are Secured—Big Attendance at Sale.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 20.—The sale of Christmas cattle at the Portland Union stockyards last Tuesday under the auspices of the Portland Livestock Exchange was a tremendous success and some history making prices were secured. The grand champion steer sold at \$25 per hundred pounds; the grand champion cow at \$10.25 per 100 pounds; the champion carload of steers sat at \$9 per 100 pounds, with other carloads and single animals in proportion. There was a big attendance and much enthusiasm. When it is considered that the grand champion single steer of the International Livestock exposition sold at \$18 per 100 pounds it can be seen that Portland has made a record.

Receipts for the week have been 1690 cattle, 2927 sheep, 2365 hogs and 193 calves.

The market on all classes of cattle has been consistently strong in the face of lower prices in the eastern centers. Good steers have sold at \$4.75; good cows at \$3.75, and other classes of cattle proportionately strong.

The hog market has ruled strong to higher at Portland, while Chicago and other markets have quoted hogs weak to 10c lower. Top hogs on this market have sold at \$8.65, with bulk of sales at \$8.25 to \$8.50.

The sheep market has been poorly supplied and prices have ruled full 25c higher on all classes. Good wethers sold for \$5 and lambs at \$6.50. There should be more sheep on the market. Stock raisers of the Pacific northwest have cause for congratulation in that their livestock market is at a high point.
