## HOLIDAY DULLNESS HITS LIVE STOCK

Prices, However, Hold Up Well—Fancy Stock Is Offered in Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 25.—The usual holiday dullness has characterized the week's market. This has applied to receipts, but while there was not a great deal of life in the matter of demand, prices have held a high level with a 25 per cent increase in sheep and from 5 to 10 per cent advance on cattle; hogs have remained steady at the high level of last week. One sale reported at \$8.85, but the bulk of the sales have been from \$8.25 to \$8.50. Quite a number of stock hogs came to market and were taken by country feeders at prices around \$7.50.

Receipts were: Cattle 1016; calves 27; sheep 527; hogs 3640; goats 268 and horses 40. In the matter of cattle sales, there were several loads of good fleshy steers, some of which sold at \$5.00 and others at \$4.82½. One load of cows sold for \$3.82½. Indifferent quality stuff sold at about the same prices as the week before.
