

## WAR CLOUD STILL DARK IN SOUTH

Report Out That Nicaragua Revolutionists Are Preparing to Continue Warfare in Central America.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 1.—The feeling here that the revolutionists are planning simultaneous attacks upon Greytown and Acapulco today has assumed almost the proportions of a certainty.

Following General Estrada's announcement that he would refuse to recognize Madriz as president and the delivery of his ultimatum containing alternative propositions for the selection of a chief executive, Madriz supporters are convinced that the insurgent leader is planning an attack upon one of the government strongholds.

Greytown, they believe, is the objective point he has decided upon. As a result of this belief, General Toledo today was ordered to that city. General Vasquez at the same time was ordered to Acapulco, where a second attack is feared.

The new bridge across Rogue river which, including approaches, has cost about \$22,000, is not included in the above. The expenses for the year 1910 will necessarily be about what they have been this year. The greater part of the expenditures are statutory and beyond the control of the county court. If road work is continued it will require a three-mill tax levy. It is impossible to do substantial road work without money.

## ONE DEAD; TWO HURT CHICAGO CELEBRATION

CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—One man is dead and two are thought to be dying as the direct result of New Year's celebrations reported to Chicago police today.

Irving Standford was stabbed with a knife and killed by his sweetheart, Mabel Hansen, with whom he had been seeing the old year out. The girl was arrested and charged with murder.

Harry Moats shot Cornelius Lutterman five times when he found Lutterman with Mrs. Florence Culver, Moats' sweetheart.

Harry Featherstone, reported to be an ex-convict, is dying as a result of shots fired by Policeman Maloney, who ordered Featherstone to discontinue a disturbance which he was causing. Featherstone was fired twice at the policeman who returned the fire with probable fatal results.

## ANTIPODES WANT BURNS—JOHNSON FIGHT AGAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1.—Hugh McIntosh, the Australian fight promoter, wants to match Jack Johnson any Tommy Burns for another fight in the antipodes, according to a cablegram to a local sporting man.

McIntosh would match the big negro and Burns for a purse of \$40,000, on a winner take all basis next September. In his cable he declared that the money to guarantee the purse had already been deposited and that Burns had affixed his signature to an agreement to fight.

## SHEEP HEADERS SROOTS EASTERN OREGON MAN

PRAIRIE CITY, Or., Jan. 1.—David Gilman, a young man, is believed to be dying today as the result of being shot yesterday at Canyon City by a sheep herder named Stewart.

It is said that Stewart aimed the gun at Gilman, saying: "This is the way Coell Bryan shoots," and pulled the trigger. It is not known whether Stewart knew the gun was loaded or not.

## BIG SHORTAGE IS DISCOVERED

San Francisco Adds \$90,000 to the Amount Claimed Short in Books of Former Treasurer.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1.—Nearly \$90,000 has been added to the city's claim against former Treasurer Charles A. Bantel since action was brought against him a year ago for \$60,000 alleged shortage revealed in his accounts as treasurer from 1906 to 1908. In a civil suit filed late yesterday San Francisco laid claim to \$90,000 that has not been accounted for by Bantel. The Actna indemnity company was also named as a defendant as Bantel's surety. The former official's bond amounted to \$100,000.

The present suit is in substitution of one filed a year ago. Since the commencing of that action experts and the board of supervisors claim to have discovered further shortages.

The present suit for the recovery of shortages that all occurred in "special fund" includes those alleged to have been caused by James A. Tomalty, Bantel's chief bookkeeper, who was sentenced to five years' imprisonment after conviction on a charge of falsifying public records and whose case is now on appeal.

## FRESNO HAS FIRST SNOW STORM IN 28 YEARS

FRESNO, CAL., Jan. 1.—For the first time in 28 years, Fresno this morning experienced a genuine snow storm. The flakes began to fall at 5 o'clock this morning and continued for several hours until the whole country was covered with a mantle of beautiful white. The fall varied from a fraction to two inches. Snowballing is being indulged in by old and young and the town is greatly excited.

Camera men are early on the scene and photographs are being taken all around the town.

A great feature was a snow man built by some enthusiasts in the court house yard.

## FAMOUS CLAIRVOYANT WANTED FOR STEALING

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1.—Dr. Alexander Astro, the famous clairvoyant, who is wanted by the police here on a charge of embezzlement, was located today in Mexico City. He will be extradited.

Astro secured \$500 from James P. O'Kelly, the scow boat man, by representing that he would return the long lost daughter of O'Kelly. Astro produced a young woman, who fitted the description and was paid the money. The girl soon afterwards disappeared and then it was learned that the girl had only been substituted for the purpose of securing the money.

## BODY FOUND IN RIVER WEIGHTED BY ROCK

SANTA MONICA, Cal., Jan. 1.—Weighted down with three bricks, which had been stuffed under the waistband of his trousers, the body of Charles C. Colbain was found under the pier here today. The body had been in the water probably a month.

What was first thought to have been murder is now believed to be suicide, as \$15 and a gold watch was found in his pocket.

The case has been reported to the police and coroner and an investigation is being made.
