REAL ESTATE AGENT GETS COMMISSION

J. H. Grace Wins Suit in Circuit Court for Commission on Real Estate—Verdict \$4,025.

The case of J. H. Grace vs. Robert S. McDowell, being an action to recover money in the matter of a sale of real estate occupied the attention of the circuit court Tuesday.

The case was one in which a dispute arose over the amount of commission to be paid for the sale of certain lands situated in Sams Valley. The valuation of these lands in the first instance was placed at \$9000 and the plaintiff was promised all over that sum he could secure. The property was sold for \$13,200, and the former owner refused to come through with the \$4,200.

The case came up for trial Monday and the following jury was empaneled: H. L. Gregory, John Cameron, Wiley Turnbaugh, R. H. Hatley, L. A. Abbott, Chas. Fields, Ralph Billings, John Albright, H. D. Kubli, Aaron Beck, W. M. Childers, G. E. Fox.

After being out but a short time the jury returned a verdict of \$4,025 for the plaintiff. It having been established that \$175 had been paid him before the action was commenced.

The case will very likely be appealed.

ANACONDA SMELTER TO REOPEN AT ONCE

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Jan. 5.—Upon the receipt of assurances from the officials of the Great Northern railroads, that they themselves will switch the companies' trains at Great Falls, in order to allow the resumption of work at the old and Montana smelters, the Amalgamated Copper company announced today that their mines and plants will continue in operation.

The re-opening of the Great Falls smelter will mean relief to the men employed in the plant who were thrown out of work when the smelter was closed following the strike of the switchmen on the Northern railroads. The Amalgamated company announced, too, that they would agree to operate their plants as long as the Butte miners union refrained from interfering with the men at work in the Great Northern yards at Great Falls. In case of the violation of this order, the company said a complete suspension of work in all of the Amalgamated properties will follow.

WOMAN FOUND WITH FEAR PLAIN ON FACE

SAN JOSE, Cal., Jan. 5.—The authorities today are searching the Second street home of Mrs. Mary Mauerhan in the hope of finding a trace of the man or beast thought to have frightened the woman to death yesterday. Neighbors were attracted by the shrieks of Mrs. Mauerhan. They heard the woman running from room to room, and then there was silence. Mrs. Herbert, living next door, was the first to reach the house. She hastily called on the neighbors. Mrs. Herbert searched the house for Mrs. Mauerhan but failed to find her. Outbuildings and the yard were carefully gone over without a trace of the woman. Then some one found Mrs. Mauerhan huddled behind a pantry door, dead. Fear was written indelibly on her face. It was thought that the woman, who was ill, was frightened to death by some animal that had strayed into her bed room.

JEALOUSY CAUSE OF SAN FRANCISCO TRAGEDY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—The body of James Allen Roberts, a 21-year-old street car conductor, is in the morgue today, and Miss Tinnie Tonnesen, his sweetheart, 18 years of age, is prostrated as the result of Roberts' insane jealousy.

The conductor fired four shots at Miss Tonnesen, in her home last night, none of them taking effect. A heavy shell comb in her hair which deflected one of the bullets, probably saved the young woman's life.

When Roberts saw the front door close behind the fleeing woman he turned the smoking gun on himself and sent a bullet into his brain. He died a few minutes later while being removed to a hospital.

TONED BOOZE WITH WOOD ALCOHOL; SICK

Bootlegger Operates in Pendleton and Poisons Eighteen Persons With Poor Booze.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 5.—Eighteen persons are said to have been poisoned here Christmas day through the avariciousness of an ignorant "bootlegger." It is said that the details have just been made public. The victims as well as the illicit liquor seller tried to keep the case quiet. It is said a "bootlegger" shipped in a barrel of whiskey for the holiday trade, and as the demand was greater than the supply, he proceeded to dilute his liquor until there was neither flavor nor color left. He then undertook to tone up the beverage with wood alcohol. The result was disastrous. In all thirteen persons were made sick, eight called in physicians and one is said to have been in danger of losing his life.

LEAD FOR HIS LOVE BUT ASKS DIVORCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—Dr. Walter Lampe, whose wife, Mrs. Jessie Lampe, fired a bullet into his head on August 19, today brought suit for divorce. Lampe alleged two attempts had been made on his life, one of which he still carried a souvenir in the shape of a bullet located somewhere in his head.

The physician declared that he had signed a false statement to the effect that the shooting which nearly cost him his life had been accidental. His love for his wife, he said, prompted the lie when he believed he was on his death bed.

Dr. Lampe complained that Mrs. Lampe has forced him to sign statements that he had been untrue to her and that he would not oppose a divorce suit she intended to bring.
